Blessed Sacrament Parish Will Build New \$200,000 School

Blessed Sacrament parish is to have a new school building. Announcement of his plans for the new building were made at all the masses last Sunday morning by the rector, the Rev. Thomas F. Connors. He said the time had come when the present school building, which fronts on Monroe avenue, between Oxford and Rutgers streets, has been found inadequate. The building is not fireproof and repairs and an addition are necessary which would require an expenditure of many thousands of dollars and, as Father Connors pointed out, "we would still have an old building with a patch on it."

Plans for the new school are now being prepared. The building, which will be modern in every respect, will provide adequate classrooms, a large gymnasium for use by the boys and girls attending the school, and an equally large auditorium in which meetings and the social affairs of the parish can be held.

It is understood that the new school building will occupy all the space on the church property between Oxford and Rutgers streets. Three houses and the present school building will necessarily have to be razed. Work on the new school, which will cost in the neighborhood of \$200,000, will be started in the spring, provided Father Connors has \$75,000 in his building fund. Bishop Hickey has given his approval to the project and consented to the announcement of the plans for the new school which, it is expected, will be one of the most modern and completely equipped of any school in the diocese and one of the largest of any single parish in the city.

Leaves \$15,000 To Catholic Institutions

Katherine H. Kaveny, who died Aug. 28, leaving \$30,000 in real estate and \$5,000 in personal property, made bequests totaling almost \$15,000 to Catholic institutions in Rochester, for the erection of memorials to her relatives, according to the will admitted to probate Thursday in Surrogate's Court.

Institutions receiving such legacies are: St. Bernard's Seminary, \$10,200; St. Ann's Home for the Aged, \$2,000; St. Mary's Orphan Asylum and St. Patrick's Orphan Asylum, \$1,000 each; and Nazareth Convent, \$200.

Other bequests made by Mrs. Kaveny were: Helen Collins, Matie Collins, Gertrude Canan and Christina Kaveny of Canandaigua, \$2,589.40 each, and Mary Kaveny of Canandaigua, \$2,500. This residue of the estate is divided in small shares among cousins and friends.

Mrs. Kaveny also created a trust fund of \$3,000 in the Rochester Trust and Safe deposit Company, named executor of the will. The income from the trust fund will be used to "paint the chairs and settees" in the Kaveny lot in Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

Services Held For Mother Fleishman

Rev. Mother Regina Fleishman died Wednesday night at the Academy of the Sacred Heart, after a service of thirty years in the Order of the Sacred Heart and fifteen years in the academy, aged 68 years.
