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## Many Priests Attend Funeral Services of Rev. T. D. Kennedy

Funeral services for Rev. Thomas Daniel Kennedy, rector of St. John the Baptist Church, Lonsdale, Ill., who died on December 18th, took place Thursday morning at 8:30 o'clock at the family home, Kennedycrest, in Blossom road, and 9:30 o'clock at Corpus Christi Church.

The body of Father Kennedy arrived in Rochester Wednesday morning and was taken to the family home where it was viewed by his many Rochester friends among the clergy and laity until Thursday morning.

Solemn mass of requiem was celebrated by his friend, Rev. J. Francis O'Hern, assisted by Rev. Joseph F. Dissett as deacon, and Rev. Emmet F. Magee as subdeacon. Among the clergy in the sanctuary were his former classmates in St. Andrew's Seminary, Troy, Rev. John J. Bresnahan, rector of St. Bridget's Church, and Rev. John McMahon, of St. Patrick's Cathedral. Members of the Community of the Sisters of St. Joseph, Sisters of Mercy, Holy Name Society and the Knights of Columbus attended the services at the church.

After the mass the body was taken to Geneva, where interment was made in St. Patrick's cemetery next to the graves of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John B. Kennedy. The services at the grave were conducted by Mgr. Joseph W. Hendrick, rector of St. Francis de Sales Church, Geneva.

The active bearers here were Mgr. O'Hern, Rev. Joseph F. Dissett, Rev. Emmet F. Magee and Rev. Eugene Golding. Father Kennedy, who was graduated from St. Mary's University, Baltimore, June 21, 1894, was ordained for the diocese of Peoria, Ill., by Cardinal Gibbons. His first assignment was as chancellor of the Peoria diocese and rector of St. Mary's Cathedral, Peoria. He also was rector of churches at Elkhart, Wyo., and Campus and Lonsdale, Ill. During his years of service in the Peoria diocese he erected and paid for church edifices at Mount Pulaski and Camp Grove, Ill.

Father Kennedy leaves four sisters, Mrs. John H. Anderson, Mrs. Rose K. Crowley and Miss Mary A. Kennedy, all of this city, and Mrs. W. E. Ryan, of Elkhart, Ill., and two brothers, John J. E. and Louis A. Kennedy, of this city.

The Employment Department has been particularly fortunate in placing its graduates—many of whom have been advanced to executive and managerial positions.

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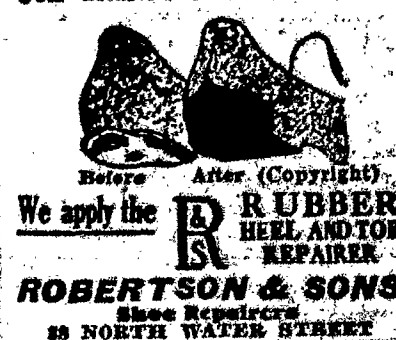
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
