Action on the disposition of thousands of dollars said to have been paid by Rochesterians for Irish Republican bonds four years ago is expected to be made at an open meeting of the Rochester branch of the American Association for the Recognition of the Irish Republic Saturday evening at 8 o'clock in Red Man's Hall, South Fitzhugh street.

The money is now said to be "frozen" in New York, and the Irish Free State is claiming part of it. The bondholders will make known Saturday night whether they wish to have their money turned back to them, turned over to the Free State, or used for other purposes in Ireland. Upwards of five hundred Rochester bondholders are expected to attend. Leo Mansweeney will be the principal speaker at the meeting, which will be in charge of Captain Andrew Kavanaugh, of the police traffic squad. There will be dancing and a free entertainment, following the business meeting.

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
