

Radio Helping Irish Farmers To Obtain Better Food Prices

Dublin, Jan. 18.—Irish agricultural producers have always suffered from a lack of seasonal and business information. Particulars as to crops and market prices were officially collected, but by the time they were printed and circulated they were out of date. Repeatedly the priests of rural parishes have pointed out the enormous disadvantage at which farmers were placed through this failure to supply them promptly with the facts they needed.

Chief Rabbi, Visiting Dublin, Pays Warm Tribute To Irishmen

Dublin, Jan. 18.—"I have never gone anywhere in the world that I did not find some Jews or Irishman had preceded me," said the Rev. Dr. Hertz, Chief Rabbi of the British Empire and holder of the most exalted position in Israel, when he was publicly entertained in Dublin on the occasion of his mission to the Irish Jews.

Nelson Monument In Dublin Will Go, Washington's Stands

Dublin, Jan. 18.—In O'Connell Street, the principal thoroughfare of Dublin, five monuments hold central positions on the pavement, in honor of O'Connell, Sir John Gray, Lord Nelson, Father Matthew, and C. S. Parnell. The Nelson Column is midway in the street, and rises to a height of 130 feet. The agitation to have it removed as an obstruction to traffic has gone on for decades; but only now is it likely to come to success.

Convert Wins Royal Scotch Post Rarely Held By A Catholic

Welsh Board Rejects Sterilizing of Unfit

Detroit's Catholic Boys Lead In Safety Patrol Movement

Detroit, Jan. 19.—When 2,000 "junior policemen," known in Detroit as "safety patrols," gathered here for their semi-annual meeting, it was found that 900 of them were from Catholic schools. The public schools of the city sent 1,000 and the Lutheran schools 100. At present 64 Catholic schools of the Detroit diocese have patrol representation.

Priest Rescues Man From Burning Chapel At Risk Of Own Life

San Francisco, Jan. 18.—James P. Ginnane, janitor of the Newman Club's Catholic chapel at the University of California, Berkeley, nearly lost his life in an attempt to save the building from destruction by fire. He was rescued by the Rev. T. C. Peterson, C. S. P., Chaplain of the Club, who sustained painful injuries in making the rescue.

Apostolic Delegate Guest of Archbishop Glennon In St. Louis

St. Louis, Jan. 19.—The Most Rev. Pietro Fumasoni-Biondi, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, was the guest of Archbishop Glennon last week Tuesday. He was accompanied by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. George L. Leech, secretary of the Delegation.

Louvain Will Open Library U. S. Built On 500th Birthday

Nicaea Observances Held By Eight Rites In One Week In Paris

Father Lynch Gives Four Hundred Talks On Missions In Year

Jesuit Organizer Of India Catholics Goes To Scotland

London, Jan. 18.—The well-known Indian Catholic editor, Father Albert Gille, S. J., has taken up work in Edinburgh at the Sacred Heart church, Lauriston. He is the author of the satirical "Editor's Prayer," to St. Francis which traveled around the American Catholic press last year.

Monsignor Welch's Consecration Date Tentatively Feb. 3

St. Louis Cathedral To Be Consecrated

Sienna Sacred Hosts, Preserved Since 1730, To Have New Chalice
