**Weekly Calendar
Of Feast Days**

Sunday, January 31.—St. Marcella, Widow, called by St. Jerome the "glory of the Roman Women", was widowed seven months after she was married. She rejected an opportunity for a second marriage and resolved to devote the remainder of her days to the services of God, imitating the lives of the ascetics of the East. She abstained from wine and flesh-meat and devoted her time to pious reading, prayer, and visiting the churches. She never spoke to any man alone after her husband died. Many pious women followed her example and many monasteries were established in Rome. She suffered severely when the Goths under Alaric plundered Rome in 410.

Monday, February 1.—St. Brigid, Abbess and Patroness of Ireland, was born about the year 453 at Fochard in Ulster. When about twenty years old she made known to St. Mel, the nephew and disciple of St. Patrick, her intention to live only for Jesus Christ, and he received her sacred vows. As she made her vows a disfiguring affliction from which she had suffered was cured. Several other ladies, encouraged by her example, made similar vows and the Saint established the first convent in Ireland for them. Later at the invitation of the Bishops she established many other convents in different parts of Ireland. She died in 523 and her body was interred in the church adjoining the convent but later was exhumed and deposited in a shrine near the high altar. When the country was devastated by the Danes in the ninth century her body was removed to Downpatrick and placed in the same grave with the remains of St. Patrick. Afterwards the two bodies with that of St. Columba were placed in the Cathedral of that city but their monument was destroyed during the reign of Henry VIII. The head of St. Brigid is preserved in the Jesuit Church in Lisbon.

Tuesday, February 2.—The Purification or Candlemas-Day. The law of God, given by Moses to the Jews, ordained that a woman, after childbirth, should continue for a certain time in a state which she was not to appear in public, nor presume to touch anything consecrated to God. On the expiration of the term, the mother was to bring to the door of the tabernacle, or Temple, a lamb, and a young pigeon or turtle-dove, as an offering to God. Our Saviour having been conceived by the Holy Ghost and His Blessed Mother remaining that she did not come under the law; but as the world was, as yet, ignorant of her miraculous conception, she submitted with great punctuality and exactness to every humbling circumstance which the law required.

Wednesday, February 3.—St. Blasius, Bishop and Martyr, devoted the earlier years of his life to the study of philosophy and afterwards became a physician. He decided to devote his life to the service of God and was chosen Bishop of Sebaste. During the persecution under the Emperor Licinius the Saint was seized and hurried off to prison. When he refused to worship the false gods of the heathens, St. Blasius was first scourged; his body was then torn with hooks, and finally he was beheaded in the year 316.

Thursday, February 4.—St. Jane of Valois, the daughter of Louis XI of France, led a life remarkable for its humiliations even in the annals of the Saint. The King who had hoped for a son, banished her from the palace and later forced her to marry the Duke of Orleans. She founded the Order of the Annunciation, the rule of which was approved by Alexander XI. She died in 1502.

Friday, February 5.—St. Agatha, Virgin and Martyr, was born in Sicily of rich and noble parents. She always a spotless virgin, it is evident was consecrated from her earliest infancy to God and in the midst of temptations she served Christ in purity of body and soul and she died for the love of chastity. Quintianus, the Governor of Sicily under the Emperor Decius tried to seduce her, and when she repulsed him he had her tortured and finally killed.

Saturday, February 6.—St. Dorothy, Virgin and martyr, was the daughter of holy parents who were martyred before her in the Diocletian persecution. She was seized stretched upon the rack and offered marriage if she would consent to sacrifice to the heathen gods or death if she should refuse. She refused, and after being tortured was beheaded.

**Belfast Politicians
Would Bar Catholic
Lawyers In Ulster**

Dublin, Jan. 18.—To segregate the Northeast territory from the rest of Ireland in such a way as to make it an English rather than an Irish area is the aim of certain political agents whose latest move is to repudiate the ancient legal training ground in Dublin and to arrange for the creation of a new Inn of Court in Belfast, where all barristers practicing in the Northeast must be trained in future. At first an attempt was made to hitch the Northeast on to the London Inns, so that law students would take the profession in England instead of at the King's Inns in Dublin; but so far the English Benchers have declined to countenance such an innovation. Failing this, the separatists decided to found a legal Inn of their own, and form a Bar for the limited region of the Six-Counties governed from Belfast. Serious questions of legal compe-

**Fr. Macelwane Chosen
Eastern Chairman
By Seismologists**

St. Louis, Jan. 23.—Rev. James B. Macelwane, S. J., Professor of Geophysics of St. Louis University, has been chosen chairman of the newly organized Eastern Section of the Seismological Society of America and is now arranging a program for a meeting to be held in Washington in April in conjunction with the meetings of the National Academy of Sciences and the American Geophysical Union.

The other officers of the section are Ernest Hodgson, Chief of the Seismological Division, Dominion Observatory Ottawa, Canada, Vice-Chairman; and Commander N. H. Heck, Chief of the Division of Seismology and Magnetism of the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey, Washington, D. C., Secretary and Treasurer.

**Storm Destroys Hut
Just Built For Mass
By English Laborers**

London, Jan. 18.—Months of hard work on the part of a priest and a small congregation of laborers have been spent in vain through the destruction of a little mission hut about seven miles from Dunsop Bridge, on the Yorkshire Moors.

Completed only a few weeks ago, the hut was blown down in a storm, which was so fierce that it carried the building twelve feet from the site on which it was erected.

The little church was built for the convenience of the Catholics among the laborers engaged on the Flyde Waterworks. Realizing that it was impossible for the men to go to Dunsop Bridge for Mass, the parish priest there, Father Marchal, opened a fund on their behalf, to which the men themselves contributed generously.

The wrecking of the hut is the more unfortunate because there seems no hope that the small congregation will be able to build another.

**Cleveland Council,
K. Of C., Dedicates
Clubhouse Addition**

Cleveland, O., Jan. 23.—An addition to the club house of Cleveland Council, Knights of Columbus was dedicated by Rt. Rev. Joseph Schrembs, Bishop of Cleveland, on Sunday.

The new building, which cost approximately \$250,000, includes an auditorium with seating capacity of 1200, which may also be used as a ball room, a gymnasium and bowling alleys.

The dedication program included addresses by Mayor John D. Marshall, Cleveland, Martin A. Carmody, Deputy Supreme Knight of the Order, Bishop Schrembs. Mr. Carmody reviewed the work the Knights had done in boy welfare work in this country and described the establishment of playgrounds in Rome.

Bishop Schrembs said the problem of the wayward boy and the girl between 14 and 20 was one of the most serious by which the Church was faced.

**St. Louis University
Professor On Bone
As Sound Transmitter**

St. Louis, Jan. 23.—An interesting report upon bone transmission of sound by Dr. A. G. Pohlman, Professor and Director of the Department of Anatomy of St. Louis University Medical School, appeared in the December issue of The Nation's Health. Dr. Pohlman has devoted much time and study to the investigation of sound transmission in reference to ear diseases. His experiments reveal that the sensitivity of bone transmission is much greater than that of air transmission.

**Martin Behrman, Five
Times Mayor Of City
Of New Orleans, Dead**

New Orleans, Jan. 19.—Martin Behrman, Mayor of New Orleans for five terms, was buried this morning after funeral services in St. Louis Cathedral. Preceding the funeral his body lay in state in the City Hall.

Mr. Behrman was a native of New York who came to New Orleans in 1865 and started his business career as a grocery clerk. He entered State politics in 1904 and was chosen Auditor. He served for a few months and resigned to become a candidate for Mayor. He was elected. In 1908, 1911 and 1916 he was re-elected. Deceased in 1925 by Andrew J. Mc-

**Priest Is Rescuer
When Trolley Car
Plunges Into River**

Pittsburgh, Jan. 22.—When a trolley car carrying thirty passengers dived into the Ohio River at McKees Rocks, near here, killing three and injuring others, the Rev. George A. Baumer, assistant pastor of St. Mary's Catholic Church, McKees Rocks, was one of the first who crawled down the steep bank and helped to extricate the passengers who still lived.

The car jumped the track on a curve, snapped off a telegraph pole, crashed through a guard rail, and plunged fifty feet into the water.

**Bishop's Will Makes
Provision For New
And Existing Mission**

London, Jan. 18.—A new mission will be founded and maintained in the Birmingham diocese out of a bequest made by the late Bishop Glancey, Auxiliary of Birmingham, who at the beginning of last year gave stimulus in England to a new Church Extension movement similar to that founded by Bishop Francis C. Kelley in the United States.

Bishop Glancey, who died in October last, left about \$80,000, all of which, with the exception of a sum of money for the erection of memorials, he bequeathed to the Archdiocese of Birmingham. In his will he requested that his property should be used (1) for the benefit of Oscott College, the diocesan seminary, (2) to found and support a new mission and (3) to support an existing mission.

**American Indians
In England Attend
Mass In Full Costume**
