Weekly Calendar Of Feast Days

Sunday, Feb. 21—St. Severian, Martyr and Bishop. After the Council of Chalcedon had condemned the Eutychian heresy Theodosius, an ignorant Eutychian monk under the protection of the Empress Eudovia perverted many of the monks themselves and forced Juvenal, Bishop of Jerusalem to withdraw from that important see. Many had the courage to resist the heretic and among them none resisted with greater zeal and courage than Severianus, Bishop of Scythopolis. His recompense was a crown of martyrdom in about the year 452.

Monday, Feb. 22—St. Peter's Chair at Antioch is the feast established in recognition of Peter's founding of the See of Antioch before he went to Rome. Antioch was then the capital of the East and it was just that the Prince of the Apostles should take this city under his particular care and inspection. St. Leo says we ought to celebrate the chair of St. Peter with no less joy than the day of his martyrdom, for as in this he was exalted to a throne of glory in heaven, so by the former he was installed head of the Church on earth.

Tuesday, Feb. 23—St. Peter Damian was born in 988 and lost both parents at an early age. A brother, who was a priest, sent him to the University of Parma where he acquired great learning and perfected himself in piety. He joined the monks of Font-Avellano, then in high repute, and rose to be their Superior. Seven Popes in succession made him their constant adviser and he was created Cardinal Bishop of Ostia. He died at Faenza in a monastery of his order in 1072.

Wednesday, Feb. 24—St. Matthias, Apostle, was chosen by lot to take the place of Judas. It is recorded of the Saint thus wonderfully elected to so high a vocation, that he was above all remarkable for his mortification of the flesh.

Thursday, Feb. 25—St. Tarasius was a native of Constantinople, born of a noble family about the middle of the eighth century. He became Secretary of State to the Emperor Constantine and to the latter's mother, the Empress Irene. In the midst of the court and its highest honors he led a life like that of a religious man. He was chosen to succeed the Patriarch of Constantinople when the latter resigned his See.

Friday, Feb. 26—St. Porphyry, Bishop, was a rich citizen of Thessalonica who left the world for one of the great religious houses in the desert of Scete. In 393 he was ordained priest and entrusted with the care of the relics of the True Cross. Later he became Bishop of Gaza, then a hotbed of paganism. His labors and the miracles which attended them effected the conversion of many; and an imperial edict for the destruction of the pagan temple, obtained through the influence of St. John Chrysostom greatly strengthened his hands. He lived to see his diocese for the most part clear of idolatry and died in the year 420.

Saturday, Feb. 27—St. Leander, Bishop, was born of an illustrious family at Carthage in Spain. He became Bishop of Seville and was no less zealous in the reformation of manners than in restoring the purity of faith. He died about 596.
