Party Meetings In Ireland Now Held Side by Side

Dublin, Feb. 22.—The Daily election contest in Leix-Offaly has brought the Republicans back into the field against the Government party. It is an omen of the abatement of political animosity that on several occasions both sections held their meetings almost side by side, yet no disagreeable episode occurred in consequence. Leading issues were the economic outlook and the future of education. It is now difficult for an orator to make a continuous speech in Ireland, hecklers are active. Politicians are closely questioned as to unfulfilled promises. The spirit of the populace has become analytical, but angry passions have been away.

In Leix-Offaly (formerly King's and Queen's Counties) the Republic has caused a degree of surprise and

interest by announcing that Father Coyle, P. P., was coming from County Fermanagh to join in their campaign. Father Coyle is the pastor of West Devenish, Fermanagh County, who has been untiring in his exposure of the conditions of tyranny under which Catholics have to live in the North-East area, which the Belfast Government administers.

Of considerable public influence, he crossed the border and threw his weight on the Free State side in the elections in Tyrone County a few years ago, largely helping to secure the return of Mr. Blythe, T. D., now to the post of Minister for Finance. The recent London Agreement, whereby the North-East Boundary is to undergo no change, found a redoubtable opponent in Father Coyle, who has now severed his connection with State ideas in order, as he says, that he may keep before the country the vital importance of never ceasing to oppose the sectarian dividing line which cuts the nation in twain.

Impersonating Priest, New Yorker Arrested On Charge Of Fraud

New York, Feb. 26.—After he had been arrested while trying to cash two drafts for \$3,500 each, alleged to have been obtained under false pretenses, Dominick Roche, a slight, white-haired, timid appearing man, told the police that for the past five years he has defrauded numerous Catholics by impersonating a Catholic priest. He also admitted, according to the police, that he had served prison terms in half a dozen States under a name similar to that of the company.

The incident which led to his arrest was his collection of \$3,700 cash from a firm of lawyers whom he had employed to collect a claim which he said he had against an engineering company growing out of the sale of a steam shovel. The lawyers had entered into correspondence

with the company, at the address furnished by their client, and after considerable negotiating had received a check from the company. They cashed the check for the priest and, after deducting their fee, turned the balance over to him in cash. Later it was learned that the engineering company had no office at the address given but that a man who answered the bogus priest's description had a post-office box there.
