Monday, March 22.—St. Catherine of Sweden, Virgin, was the daughter of Uppho, Prince of Nersea, and of St. Bridget. She was placed in the convent of Risburgh at the age of seven where she was trained in piety under the holy abbess. Her father gave her in marriage to Egard, a young nobleman of great virtue, but she persuaded him to join with her in a vow of perpetual chastity. After her mother's death at Rome in 1373, Catherine returned to Sweden and died Abbess of Vadstena in 1381.

News Service) New York, March 13.—Protest against the persecution of the Catholic Church and its religious and lay members in Mexico is carried in resolutions adopted by the Catholic Converts League of New York at a meeting held at the Hotel Plaza here. The league also recorded itself as emphatically opposed to the Curtis-Reed education bill pending in Congress.

St. Louis Mission Society Reports Good First Year

Klan Loses Fight To Control Schools Of Des Moines, Ia.

Des Moines, March 12.—In the hottest political campaign of the city's history, one in which two-thirds of the eligibles voted and in which previous party lines were ignored, the Ku Klux Klan has been defeated in its determined effort to gain control of the school system here. Final returns on the voting show that the Klansmen were balked by a ratio of four to three.

Diocesan Returns To American Board Of Catholic Missions

Chicago, March 12.—Returns are now being sent in by the diocese of the United States to the American Board of Catholic Missions, of which His Eminence George Cardinal Mundelein is chairman. Forty per cent of moneys collected for the general fund of the Propagation of the Faith are to be sent to the Rt. Rev. John F. Noll, Bishop of Fort Wayne, treasurer of this Board, to be used for home missions. More than fifteen dioceses already have reported.

Farmers' Conference Draws 200 To Gibbons Institute At Ridge, Md.

News Service) Ridge, Md., March 12.—The second Semi-Annual Farmers' Conference, just held here at the Cardinal Gibbons Institute, Catholic institution for the education of colored youth, drew 200 farmers, an unprecedented number. The Conference was inaugurated by the Institute as a concrete expression of its purpose to aid residents of this section of Maryland.

Health Manual Tells Of Catholic Scientist

Washington, March 12.—The first of the series of booklets on "Health Heroes" published by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company for use by junior and senior high school students is devoted to the life of a Catholic, Louis Pasteur, whose experiments developed the germ theory of disease and revolutionized the practice of medicine and surgery. The second booklet, the latest now available, is concerned with Edward Livingston Trudeau, whose contributions to the knowledge and treatment of tuberculosis have meant life and hope to many.

Col. Callahan Explains W. J. Bryan's Purpose

Louisville, March 13.—Augustus Thomas, playwright misrepresented William Jennings Bryan when he said he planned a constitutional amendment making Christianity the official religion of the United States. Col. P. H. Callahan, intimate friend of the late Commoner, declared here. Mr. Bryan, Mr. Callahan said, declared that Christianity was on the defensive and that he intended making the "fight of his life to preserve the faith of the children". He did not mention, then or later, a constitutional amendment, he said.

Proposed Blue Laws Would Block Week-end Trips Of President

Washington, March 7.—President Coolidge would have to forego his week end trips down the Potomac River aboard his yacht, the Mayflower, if the blue laws proposed for the District should be enacted. Representative Sol Bloom of New York has declared here President Coolidge gets his principal relaxation from the cars of his office by his frequent week-end cruises. Representative Bloom's interpretation of the proposed Sunday closing law came in the midst of hearings being held by the House of Representatives District Judiciary subcommittee. The meetings are attended by capacity audiences and there is much speculation as to whether the committee will report favorably on the bill.

Becoming Sister

Lawrence, Mass., March 12.—Sister Margaret Dolores of the Sisters of Notre Dame died here this week, less than a week after her fondest wish, to become a nun, had been granted. Sister Margaret, who was Miss Genevieve Kennedy, entered a Waltham convent two years ago at the age of twenty. Last week she completed her probationary period, but on the same day became seriously ill. She told her superior of her desire to be admitted fully to the order before her death, and her request was granted.

Dies Week After

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SISTERS OF MERCY JUBILEE

Providence, R. I., March 12.—Sisters of the Order of Mercy have just completed a three-day observance here of the diamond jubilee of their coming to the Diocese of Providence. It was in 1851 that a little group of nuns of the Order entered the diocese. Today the Order has 21 schools in the diocese.

Catholic Basketball Tourney

Chicago, March 13.—Thirty-two Catholic high school basketball teams, the flower of the sport in the Catholic field, met here March 18-21 in the annual National Catholic Basketball Tournament held under the auspices of Loyola University.

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
