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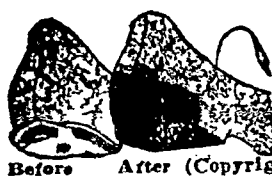
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**Annual Lenten Mission****At The Cathedral**

Aquinas Given**Big Reception**

About five thousand people crowded the New York Central Railroad station and tied up Main street traffic Monday night to welcome home the Aquinas Institute basketball team, which came within one point of "cleaning up" all other Catholic high school teams in the United States. The boys carried off second place in the National Catholic High School basketball tournament, sponsored by Loyola University in Chicago. The Rochester boys met defeat only when they played St. Xavier's of Louisville, Ky.

The parade of automobiles was led by one carrying the official party and "Billy" McCarthy, Aquinas team coach, who carried the huge cup he won as reward for having the best coached team in the tournament. The parade moved through Central avenue to Washington street, to Main street west and on to the Eastman Theatre, where the procession broke up and the team with its supporters and various guests went to the Odenbach restaurant for dinner. Meanwhile, the rest of the crowd of boys and girls, who had lined the street along the course of the parade, joined forces in a snake dance and jammed the street until 3 o'clock.

The order of the parade was as follows: Squadron of mounted police. Marshal Jenkinson and Assistant Marshal Schatzel, Senior President Thomas Riley, Immaculate Conception band, official car and two machines bearing reception committee, Aquinas players, Joe Kennedy, "Tommy" Marks, "Rip" Riley, "Jigger" Schaad, "Yenko" McNally, "Tommy" Slowe, "Tiny" Walsh and "Ske" Flynn. Red lights illuminated the streets, and there was a constant din of cheers.
