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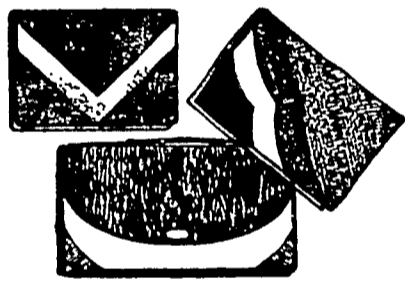

Paço of Catholic University, the Rev. Felix Kirsch, O. M. Cap., the Rev. Bernard McKenna, D. D., the Rev. Paschasius Heriz, O. C. D., the Rev. Louis Kelly, C. S. C., and the Rev. John W. Dowling, pastor of Holy Name Church, this city, a cousin of Archbishop Mooney.
