Ground Broken For St. Andrew's Church

On Tuesday morning ground was broken for the new St. Andrew's Church in Portland avenue, of which Rev. George W. Eckl is rector. The new building, which was designed by Frank Frey, architect, will be a fine example of Romanesque architecture, and will make an interesting addition to the rapidly growing group of buildings, which are now on the St. Andrew's premises, and bordering that tract of land between Barbary terrace, Duran street and fronting on Portland avenue.

The facade of the church will face the east in Portland avenue, with a tower rising to the height of 11 feet on the southeast corner. The church will be 162 feet long and with transepts 99 feet wide. The extreme width at the nave will be 62 feet. In addition to the main front entrance, there will be points of entry to the church proper on both the north and south transepts. The seating capacity will provide for 960 persons. The materials selected for developing the design will be a Pompeian buff variegated brick with Italian cream stone trimming. The roofing material calls for a variegated red tile.

One of the features of the design will be a column, at the point of the main entrance, with a rose window over it. This rose window will be 17 feet in diameter, and carried in stone. The leaded glass treatment, will be of a stone of ambers, carrying out the Romanesque spirit. The sanctuary which is semicircular in form will have the floor paved with Tennessee marble and coifure paneled dome ceiling. Surmounting the tower will be a bronze cross nine feet high.

The parish of St. Andrew's Catholic Church, organized by Rev. Joseph A. Miller, was developed from the churches of Holy Redeemer and St. Francis Xavier parishes. Shortly after the organization the present rector, Father Eckl, took charge, and during his administration he has developed in the twelve years time of his appointment since the dedication of the first building in June, 1914, the present school and church, the new rectory and finally the new church. There are between 600 and 700 families in the congregation.

The cornerstone for the new building will be laid on June 6, 1926, which will mark Father Eckl's silver jubilee since his ordination to the priesthood. The assistant priest is Rev. George M. Kolb. It is expected that the structure will be dedicated in 1927.

He then introduced Mr. Alphonse Sigl, who after telling some amusing incidents, strongly emphasized the fact of the need of cooperation in helping to build a large organization and exhorted his listeners to unite their efforts to continue the good work that they had already begun. The toastmaster then introduced Rev. Patrick A. Moffatt, assistant at Our Lady of Sorrows Church. Father Moffatt spoke briefly on the necessity of remembering the lessons and good examples learned in the Commercial School and complimented the Association on their success thus far in their united efforts. The toastmaster then called upon Mr. Clete Lochner, president of the Dante Dramatic Club to narrate "The Face on the Barroom Floor". The next speaker introduced by Mr. Durbin was Rev. John B. Leiberth, rector of St. Joseph's Church and spiritual director of the Association. Father Leiberth congratulated his hearers on their success since the birth of the Association last August and urged that the social work be continued. He spoke of how necessary it is to face life firmly and expressed the hope that the Association would continue on its way as well as it had started out.

After the banquet music was furnished for dancing by Messrs. Schmittlammers. Later in the evening a novelty tag dance was introduced which proved very popular.
