### Corpus Christi Pupils Give Demonstration

Friday evening in the state Armory, the third annual demonstration of physical training was given by the pupils of Corpus Christi School under direction of Roy V. Benson, physical director. More than 800 children of the school took part in a program which demonstrated the work of the parochial schools of the diocese of Rochester in carrying out the syllabus of physical education outlined by the state department at Albany.

Two bands played concert music and accompanied the physical culture drills of the pupils. The immaculate Conception Cadet Band led the grand march of entrance to the Armory and gave concert selections during the intermission. Lampman's Red Hussar Band gave a concert from 7:30 to 8 o'clock and accompanied the numbers of the program. Immaculate Conception Band occupied the special stand erected in the north balcony.

In addition to a reception committee and a judges' committee, a special floor committee was named to assist in placing and removing equipment and apparatus from the floor as the program progressed.

### Order of Martha Planning Bazaar

Household 118, Order of Martha is actively engaged in making the necessary preparations for the Mission Bazaar which will be held in St. Francis Xavier Hall on May 6, 7, and 8. Friday evening a grocery shower was held at the parochial hall and another is to be held next Friday evening for aprons, towels and handkerchiefs. The Order of Martha is a city-wide organization with headquarters at St. Francis Xavier Hall, having for its object to assist poor missionaries both at home and abroad. Its active members meet every Monday evening at the parish hall and make vestments and altar linens for the missions. Up to the present they have made \$11,000 valuable articles, among them being 333 sets of vestments. Its membership has grown from 28 in 1911 to nearly 700 at present.

### St. Anthony's Church To Have Requiem Mass For Archbishop Bevilacqua

Requiem high mass will be celebrated Saturday morning at 10 o'clock in St. Anthony's Church, at Frank street and Lyell avenue, for the repose of the soul of Rt. Rev. Americo Bevilacqua, archbishop of Scitopol. His nephew, Lino Bevilacqua, of No. 201 Troup street, received news of his death last week after preparations had been made to entertain the archbishop here in May when he was to come to this country with Cardinal Merry Del Val to attend the Eucharistic Congress.

Solemn high mass will be celebrated by Rev. Paul Ciacio, assisted by Rev. Sebastian Salva and other priests who knew the late archbishop personally or by reputation. Professor Florindo Ferrarese will sing the mass with a choir of forty voices. The soloists are Miss Anna Dilly, Vella Dilly, Jean Belardino, Teresa Belardino, Marion Angela, Anna Toscano, Professor Ferrarese and Patrick D'Ostillo.

Five hundred school children of St. Anthony's school will receive communion at the mass. Targuino Orsini and Angelo Colasanti are the ushers of honor. All relatives and acquaintances of the dead priest are invited to the mass.
