Church Advocates Associations On Both Sides

Rev. Howard Geck, assistant rector of St. Michael's Church, addressed the members of the Catholic Men's and Catholic Women's federations at St. Joseph's School Sunday evening. Speaking on Pope Leo XIII's encyclical "On the Conditions of Labor," issued thirty-five years ago, Father Geck pointed out that Pope Leo termed any strike a great tragedy. The present doctrine of the church, the speaker said, is that a strike is justifiable if it is called to right a wrong, if there is no violence used and if there is a reasonable chance of success. In a sympathetic strike, however, the rights of employers, general public and the workmen themselves are disregarded, he declared, and the Catholic Church refuses to countenance such a strike. "Pope Leo emphasized the right of workmen to protect themselves by strong organizations," Father Geck explained. "He believed that employers should recognize man's personal rights and dignity, and that the great hope for workingmen was in strong labor unions."

"The present system by which the employers lay down all the conditions by which men shall work is unjust. The church advocates strong associations on both sides, to set labor conditions by mutual consent. It denounces socialism and capitalism alike."

Unions are not always guided by just principles, the speaker pointed out. He urged members of the federations not to let the unions to which they belonged be headed by unprincipled men.

After the talk by Father Geck, a general discussion of the encyclical and labor conditions was led by Lawrence A. Welder, president of the men's organization, and Miss Louise Meyers, president of the women's federation.
