### Weekly Calendar Of Feast Days

Sunday, May 30 - St. Felix, I. Pope and Martyr, a Roman by birth, succeeded St. Dionysius in the government of the Church in 269. When the persecution of Aurelian broke out, St. Felix, fearless of danger, strengthened the weak, encouraged all, baptized the catechumens and continued to exert himself in converting infidels to the Faith. He himself died a martyr about 274.

Monday, May 31 - St. Petronilla, Virgin, shone like a star among the disciples of the apostles of the early Church. She is said to have been a daughter of the apostle St. Peter, who, we learn from the Gospel, was married before his vocation came to him. It is not certain, however, that St. Petronilla was more than a spiritual daughter.

Tuesday, June 1 - St. Justin, Martyr, was born of heathen parents at Neapolis in Samaria, about the year 103. He was well educated and through a persistent study of philosophy sought a knowledge of God. While walking along the seashore, an old man appeared to him who led him to a study of the writings of the inspired prophets. In his subsequent zeal he went to Egypt, Greece and Italy, gaining many converts. He died in Rome.

Wednesday, June 2 - St. Pothinus, Bishop; Sanctus, Attalus, Blandina and the other martyrs of Lyons. A violent persecution broke out at Lyons and Lyons in 177, while St. Pothinus was Bishop of Lyons and St. Irenaeus, a priest there. Many Christians were subjected to horrible tortures and death. Among them was Blandina, a slave, who was martyred last of all, after seeing her younger brother put to a cruel death.

Thursday, June 3 - St. Clotilda, Queen, was a niece of Gondebald, King of Burgundy. By a singular providence, she was instructed in the Christian religion although brought up among Arians. She modelled her life to convert Clovis I, surnamed the Great, who won her as his wife. She died on June 3, 545.

Friday, June 4 - St. Francis Caracciolo was born of a princely family in Naples. In childhood he shunned amusements and frequently visited the Blessed Sacrament. An attack of leprosy taught him the villainess of the human body, and almost miraculously cured, he studied for the priesthood. He was commonly called the "Preacher of Divine Love." He died of fever on the eve of Corpus Christi, 1608.

Saturday, June 5 - St. Boniface, Bishop, Martyr, was born at Crediton, Devonshire, England, in 680. He labored in Bavaria and Thuringia and Friesland although he was in constant danger. He aimed to make

### Tardieu Favors Religious Freedom

Paris, May 17.—M. Andre Tardieu, recently returned to Parliament as Deputy for Belfort, has delivered an important political speech following a banquet here, at which he presided. M. Tardieu suggested the formation of a new independent majority by the two blocs which are now fighting each other, namely the national bloc and the left bloc.

Formulating his program on the matter of religion, the eminent statesman said:

"I believe that the State should be secular and neutral because in France there are men of all denominations. I believe that the public school should be secular and neutral, because it receives children from families of all denominations. But, this being granted, I want the greatest liberty in religious matters, without any exception whatsoever, just as in the United States. When I outlined this program for the voters of Belfort an interrupter cried: "Then you want to bring the religious orders back to France?" "No, Monsieur," I replied, "that cannot be done. They have all come back already."

This quip was received with laughter and applause. It is in large part true.

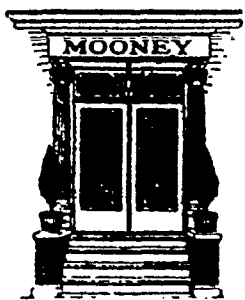

### Wills \$7,500 To St. Ann's Home

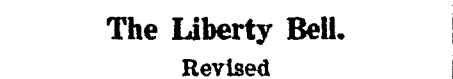
