New Church Dedicated
By Bishop Hickey

Dedication of the new Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church in Joseph avenue, near Norton street, took place Sunday morning with impressive ceremonies. Bishop Thomas F. Hickey delivered the dedicatory address and celebrated pontifical high mass.

The ceremonies began with a procession from the rectory to the church. It was headed by altar boys, members of St. John's Benevolent Society and Knights of St. John, who were an escort for Bishop Hickey. Rev. John P. Schellhorn, pastor, Rev. Michael Wurzer, assistant pastor, and many visiting clergymen.

Catholics from all sections of the city and many from other places attended benediction took place at 7:45 o'clock in the evening.

The new church is of Italian renaissance architecture, built of cream-colored brick, trimmed with terra cotta and cast stone. An attractive tower with a copper dome rises on the facade to a height of 110 feet. Here will be installed four large bells donated by various parishioners and the school children.

Father Schellhorn has been rector of the church for twenty-two years. The cornerstone of the first church was laid on September 10, 1904. Architects of the new church were Joseph H. Oberlies and George F. Lorenz.

"The fact of death confronts us all," said Bishop Hickey, in part, "but it is brought home in an especial way by the death of this young priest, who celebrated his first mass eleven months ago. Although associated with this parish but a short while, he was beloved by its people. Richly endowed with natural gifts, Father Cunningham had a high ideal of priesthood and lived up to that ideal."
