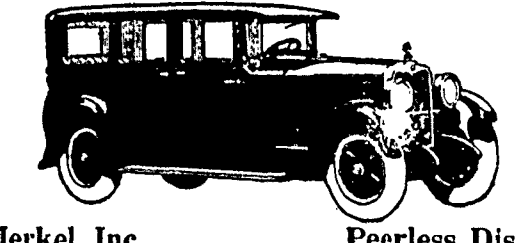


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Weekly Calendar Of Feast Days

Sunday, June 13.—St. Antony of Padua preached eloquently, worked miracles and converted men to God in France, Italy and Sicily. One night, when he was staying with a friend in Padua, the host saw a brilliant light streaming under the door of the saint's room. Peeping through the keyhole, he beheld a child of marvelous beauty standing upon a book which lay open on the table and clinging with both arms about Antony's neck. When the child vanished, the saint charged his friend to "tell the vision to no man." He died in 1231.

Monday, June 14.—St. Basil the Great was born in Asia Minor. Two of his brothers became bishops, and together with his mother and sister, are honored as saints. He was chosen Bishop of Caesarea and was God's instrument in beating back the Arian and other heresies in the East, and restoring the spirit of discipline in the Church. He died in 379 and is venerated as a Doctor of the Church. Tuesday, June 15. Sts. Vitus, Crescentia and Modestus, martyrs. Vitus was nobly born and was instructed in the Faith by his Christian nurse, Crescentia, and her husband, Modestus. His father tried by punishment and by delivering him to Valerian, the governor, to force Vitus to idolatry. But he escaped with Crescentia and Modestus to Italy, and won the crown of martyrdom in Lucania, in the persecution of Diocletian.

Wednesday, June 16.—St. John Francis Regis was born in Langue-doc in 1597. His tenderest years showed an uncommon innocence of life, modesty and love of prayer. He entered the Society of Jesus when 18 years old and gave himself to the salvation of souls. Crossing a snow-covered mountain on one of his missions, he slipped and broke his leg. He traveled six miles further, and instead of consulting a surgeon, insisted on being taken to the confession. When he was discovered there several hours later by the curate of the parish, the fracture was miraculously healed. He died at the age of 44.

Thursday, June 17.—St. Avitus, abbot, a native of Orleans, resigned his abbacy in quest of closer retirement and withdrew, a recluse, at what is now called Dunols. There, King Clothaire built a church and monastery for St. Avitus and his companions. He died about 530.

Friday, June 18.—St. Marcus and Marcellianus, martyrs, were twin brothers of an illustrious family of Rome, who had been converted to the Faith in their youth. Their endurance of persecution brought about the conversion of their father, mother and wives and of Nicestratus, public register under Diocletian, who assumed the throne in 284. They were called by their feet to the same pillar and left thus to stand for a day, and the next day they were stabbed with a lance.

Saturday, June 19.—St. Juliana Falconieri was born in 1270. Her modesty was such that she never used a mirror or gazed upon the face of a man during her life. The mere mention of sin made her tremble and shudder, and once, hearing a scandal related, she fell in a dead swoon. She was visited in her last hour by angels in the form of white doves, and Christ Himself, as a beautiful child, crowned her with a garland of flowers. She died in 1340.

Holy Rosary School To Have Field Day

After an intermission will come an inter-school relay race, silver wand drill, games, massed gymnastics and rhythmic drill led by Rhea Kern and a final salute to the flag. A trophy will be awarded to the winning school team in the relay race by the Rev. Arthur A. Hughes, pastor of the church.
