HOW
MATERIAL FOR BASEBALL BAT IS MADE PERFECT.—The wood for making baseball bats is selected with much care. Experience has taught bat makers that second-growth ash makes the best bats. Even the kind of soil the wood grows on is important, for it determines whether the bat will be strong or weak. The best ash is said to be found in those sections of the forest where the trees grow in masses, forcing them to shoot straight toward the sky in an effort to get sunlight. Here are found the straight, clear-grained ashes, capable of withstanding tremendous blows.

The selected trees are split into billets, which are carefully inspected and shipped to the bat factories. There the billets are graded by timber experts, after which they start the seasoning process. The billets are about three and a half feet long and three inches square. They are piled in tiers so the air can circulate freely through them. This drying requires from one to two years. When the billets are bone-dry they go to the lathe room where a machine rounds out the bats. They next go to expert hand turners who shape them into the desired model. There are some 30 or 40 models or types of bats. Before completion the bats pass through 11 different lathes—Pathefinder Magazine.

Vermine proof, they eliminate these obnoxious things. They can be cut to any size, are non-conductors of electricity, and do not fracture readily when cut for conduit openings.

It costs from 2 to 5 per cent more to construct a house out of cinder blocks complete with stucco than it does to build a house of the ordinary frame structure.

The Straub cinder blocks are built here in the city in the plant of the corporation on Norman Street. More than 8,000 square feet of factory space is required to manufacture four thousand blocks per day.

The Rochester Cinder Blocks Corporation is the only plant in the city using the Straub patent. It has no connection with any other firm here building cinder blocks.

How Tomahawks Were Made
Although the American Indians originated the tomahawk they later imported them. The tomahawk as originally found among the Indians was made of deer horn or stone attached to a stout wooden handle with a piece of hide. The horn or stone was chipped out in the shape of a blade and sharpened. They used them to skin their trophies and for scalping human beings in time of war. But when the Europeans came over they found a more ingenious way of making tomahawks, and traded great numbers of them to the Indians. The European tomahawks were combined pipes and tomahawks. The handles were hollow and used as stems for the pipe bowls in the knobs opposite the blades.

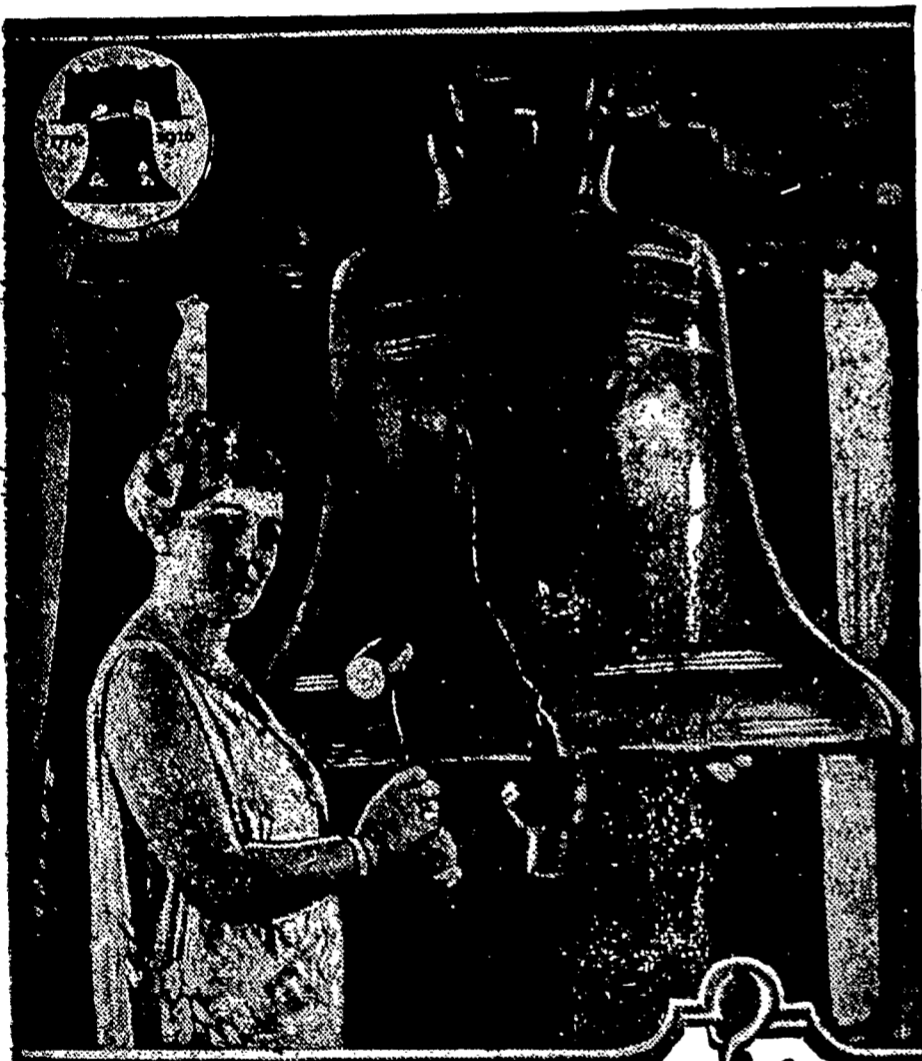
How Bottles Are Cleaned
When the thermos flask wants cleaning the best way to do it is to put in enough vinegar to cover only the bottom of the flask; then add a small handful of eggshells, well crushed into small pieces. Then fill the flask with cold water, and let it soak for a time—say an hour or two. Shake well to make the eggshell clean off any crust or grease; empty the flask, rinse it well with cold water and turn upside down to drip and dry.

How Sunspots Affect the Magnetic Needle

It is well known that there exists a most remarkable and subtle connection between sunspots and various phenomena on our earth.

In the first place, sunspots affect the movements of the magnetic needle to a marked extent. In magnetic observatories delicate instruments are installed to record the state of magnetism of the earth. Thus it is found that the compass needle does not always point to true north, but oscillates slightly to right or left, or east and west of the north point. This variation of the magnetic needle occupies a period of slightly over eleven years.

Now here is the remarkable connection. The number of spots on the sun increases and diminishes rhythmically. Sometimes very few spots are seen or perhaps none at all. Gradually, however, more and more spots appear till a maximum is reached, when their number again begins to diminish. This period of "sunspot cycle" as it is termed, also occupies a little over eleven years.

Further, if a particularly large spot breaks out it may cause the magnetic needle to behave wildly for a time. It may also give rise to brilliant displays of the "northern lights." Sometimes it may even interfere with telegraphic communication, rendering it impossible to send a message for hours. This activity is called a "magnetic storm."

How Experts Pack China

To pack china with the minimum risk of breakages you must be prepared to spend a little time on the job. See that your packing case is well lined with a good layer of straw. Then sprinkle the straw with water before putting in each article, filled and wrapped in soft paper and wound round with straw. Put a good layer of well-sprinkled straw between each layer of glass or china. The idea of the water is perfectly sound sense. It makes the straw expand so that each article is firmly wedged in place. For much-treasured bits of china or glassware you might, with advantage, provide small cardboard or wooden boxes, into which they should be tightly packed before being embedded in water-sprinkled straw.

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
