"Little Flower's" National Shrine In Chicago Opens

Chicago, June 18.—The new National Shrine of the Little Flower, imported from France and installed this week at the Carmelite Church, Sixty-fourth Street and Woodlawn Avenue, is unsurpassed in the United States and rivals the most famous shrines of Europe.

The altar proper of the new shrine is of solid marble, delicately tinted throughout in a light shade of brown to harmonize with the walnut woodwork in which the whole interior of the Carmelite Church is finished.

An immense velvet curtain, blue in tint, forms the background for the Shrine. Against this blue background there are three immense arches, composed of electric roses set in solid bronze.

The ensemble contains 543 electric lights, each in the shape of a rose, the symbol of the Little Flower. When completely lighted, the Shrine is a spectacle of dazzling brilliance and beauty.

Chicago, June 19.—Chosen to speak for the non-Catholic of Chicago at the civic welcome given to Cardinal Bonzano, Papal Legate, and other Cardinals attending the Eucharistic Congress, Samuel Insull, president of a large lighting company and leader in the commercial life of the city, in part:

"Our distinguished guest and his most distinguished colleagues would not be amongst us if industry and commerce had not built here this young among the great metropolitan centers of the world. But in our pride of what we have we do not forget what has been contributed by the forces which His Eminence, Cardinal Bonzano, personally and in his official capacity, represents.

"To find the beginning of this occasion we turn back the pages of history for two centuries and a half. There we find the imperishable record of the gentle Father Marquette, and of those of his faith who followed him, and who carried the cross through the wilderness that has become this seat of empire.

"It is a Christian people that inhabits this inland empire, of which Chicago is the visible expression. It is a friendly and mutually understanding people although compounded of elements drawn from all nations, with each element contributing its share to the composite results."
