'St. Anthony's Corner'' in the Monastery Church of the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement at Graymoor is undoubtedly the most popular center of devotion to the Wonder-Worker of Padua in America, reckoned not by the numbers of people from nearby actually visiting the Shrine, for it is located not in the crowded city but on top of a retired Mountain; but measured by the petitions sent by mail to the Friars to be presented to St. Anthony every Tuesday (St. Anthony's Special Day), when a fresh Novena starts, and since these Novenas




