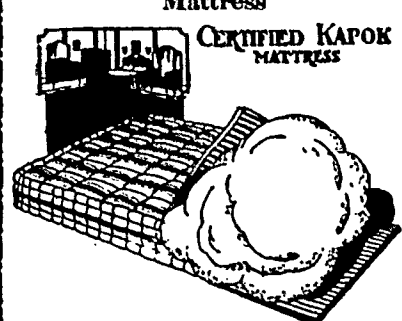

## Laying of Cornerstone Of New Church Sunday

Bishop Thomas F. Hickey will officiate Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the laying of the cornerstone of the new St. Charles Borromeo Church, Dewey avenue and Maiden Lane. The Bishop will be assisted by many priests of Rochester and the neighboring village churches.

This ceremony marks the beginning of realization of a plan for a church group building, adequate to the needs of Catholic residents of this district, according to the Rev. John M. Sellinger, rector of the new church. A site of 5½ acres has been purchased, at some future time to be occupied by a church, 16-room school and auditorium, playground and church parking station and a parochial residence.

The first building will include a church, 60 by 63 feet, with a seating capacity of 260; an auditorium, 60 by 45 feet, seating 350; four school rooms, kitchen, wash room.

The school will be opened in September with an initial enrollment of 150. Site has been reserved just east of the present building for the final church site.

This parish was incorporated Oct. 21, 1925. It now has an enrollment of 225 families. George Pearson and Leo Lawson are the lay trustees of the new parish.

Father Sellinger, first rector of the new parish, is a Rochesterian. He was educated in Cathedral parish school, St. Andrew's Seminary and St. Bernard's Seminary.

He was the first priest of the Rochester diocese selected to serve as Catholic chaplain in the World War. After a training period in Alabama, he was detailed to the First Division and sent overseas. Five months more service with the army of occupation followed the Armistice. On his return to the United States in July, 1919, he was appointed secretary to Bishop Hickey and vice-chancellor of the Rochester diocese. Three and a half years later he was appointed pastor at Sodus and Marion, where he served until last August.

He is chaplain of Frank Robertshaw Post, American Legion and a member of the State Hospitals and Welfare Committee.

## Rev. Joseph Haitz Celebrates First Solemn High Mass

At Holy Family Church last Sunday at 10:30 o'clock, the Rev. Joseph Haitz, S. J., celebrated his first solemn high mass. He is the first "boy of the parish" to be ordained to the Jesuit order.

Father Haitz was ordained to the priesthood in Woodstock, Maryland, on June 14. Assisting him at the mass was the Rev. Joseph Koch as deacon and the Rev. Joseph Wurzer as subdeacon. The Rt. Rev. Mgr. Andrew B. Meehan of St. Bernard's Seminary was assistant priest and the sermon was preached by the Rev. William P. Ryan, also of St. Bernard's Seminary. The Rev. Joseph H. Gefell, D. D., M. R., pastor of Holy Family Church, and the Rev. William W. Heisel, assistant pastor, with other members of the clergy, occupied seats in the sanctuary.

Members of the various societies of the church acted as an honorary escort to Father Haitz from his home at 39 Wright street, to the church. The young priest is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Haitz.

## Holy Redeemer Parish Plans Big Festival

The fifth annual summer festival of Holy Redeemer parish will be held July 15-17 on the church grounds. A large number of booths and concessions will be operated by the various church societies.

As an added attraction this year there will be a vaudeville show each evening in which Rochester entertainers will be seen and heard.

Mayor Martin B. O'Neill has been asked to formally open the festival on Thursday, July 15, and it is expected that other city officials will be present.

The decorations will be on an elaborate scale with hundreds of colored lights illuminating the grounds.

A surprise booth is to be a feature of the carnival. Other booths will be as follows:
