## Diocese of Rochester Numbers 201,496 Catholic People

According to the Catholic directory the diocese includes the counties of Monroe, Livingston, Wayne, Ontario, Seneca, Cayuga, Yates, Steuben, Chemung, Tioga, Schuyler and Tompkins. Its area is 7,081 square miles.

The population in the diocese is given as 201,496 Catholics, who support a total of 66 parochial schools. The diocese, of which Rochester is the see city, was established in 1868 with the Rt. Rev. Bernard J. McQuaid as its first bishop.

In the diocese there are three Catholic high schools, two academies for girls, one college for women, one preparatory seminary for aspirants to the priesthood, one theological seminary which confers degrees in philosophy and theology; four hospitals, three orphan asylums, one home for the aged, 23 chapels, 36 missions with churches, and 117 churches with resident priests.

There are 32 Roman Catholic churches and 30 parochial schools in this city, also two religious communities for men, and five religious orders for women under Bishop Hickey's jurisdiction. These orders are: Redemptorist Fathers, Fathers of the Pious Society of Missions, Sisters of Mercy, Sisters of St. Joseph, Sisters of Notre Dame, Sisters of Charity and Religious of the Sacred Heart.

Bishop Hickey is the second prelate to occupy the See of Rochester, to which he succeeded January 18, 1909, on the death of Bishop Bernard J. McQuaid. In the administration of the ecclesiastical affairs of so large a diocese the bishop has named a number of boards and committees to assist him. Among these groups are judges of the matrimonial court, members of the vigilance committee, censors of books, and a diocesan music commission.

The members of the bishop's cabinet are these diocesan consultants: The Rev. John Boppel, pastor of St. Boniface Church; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. M. J. Nolan, chancellor of the diocese; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. J. F. O'Hern, vicar general; the Rev. George V. Burns, pastor of Sacred Heart Church; the Rev. Joseph S. Cameron, pastor of Immaculate Conception Church; and the Rev. John P. Brophy, pastor of St. Monica's Church.

There are four censors of books—the Rt. Rev. Monsignor J. J. Hartley, professor of homiletics and pastoral theology, St. Bernard's Seminary; the Rev. Dr. J. F. Goggin and the Rev. Dr. Edmund J. Wirth, both professors in St. Bernard's, and the Rev. John Lieberth of St. Joseph's Church.

The judges of the matrimonial court are: Msgr. Hartley, Dr. Wirth, Dr. W. E. Cowen of St. Bernard's; Dr. Emil J. Goffel, pastor of St. Peter and Paul's Church; the Rev. George V. Burns and the Rev. Paul Ciacio. The secretary of this court is the Rev. Louis Edelman of Pittsford, and the defender of the matrimonial bond, "defensor vinculi," at the court, is the Rt. Rev. Andrew B. Meehan, J.U.D., S.T.D., rector of St. Bernard's Seminary and professor of canon law and liturgy.

## Visiting Prelate Guest Of Rector Of Local Church

Returning from the recent Eucharistic Congress in Chicago Archbishop George Matulevicius, apostolic visitor to his native country, Lithuania, visited the Rev. Joseph Kasakaitis, rector of St. George's Catholic Church in Hudson Avenue, Sunday. Accompanying him was his secretary, the Rev. Joseph Maculienis and the Rev. Joseph Zydanivys.

The archbishop is an admirer of American civilization and declared himself impressed with the progress made and conditions lived in by his countrymen in America. The visitor was in America 30 years ago when there were only three or four Lithuanian schools in the entire country. That number is greatly multiplied now to his surprise. The archbishop came to this country to visit the Marian Fathers as well as the Eucharistic Congress.

The party left Rochester Monday morning. Sunday the archbishop preached the sermon and afterward gave his blessing to the congregation of St. George's parish.
