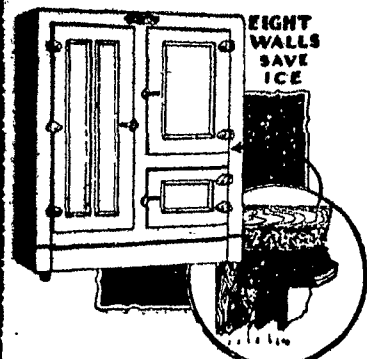


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Bible Revision Task's Progress

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"Momentous" Anglican Bishops' Session Fails To Impress Catholics

London, July 5.—Catholic clergy and laymen who have made a close study of the Anglican question for many years decline to pay too much attention to the sensational statements published during the last few days regarding the possible results of a meeting of all the Anglican diocesan bishops now being held at Lambeth Palace, London, for the consideration of the Revised Book of Common Prayer.

The principal bone of contention is a rubric already passed by the House of Clergy making legal the reservation of the "Sacrament."

One London newspaper, the Daily Express, goes so far as to say that the Church of England "is passing through the most insistent crisis that it has experienced since the Reformation." Further, it states that the "crisis" may lead to the breakaway of the 700,000 members of the Anglo-Catholic party and their eventual re-union with Rome.

Again and again the conviction has been expressed by Catholic observers—many of whom are themselves converts from Anglicanism—that there is no possibility of a wholesale landslide of "Anglo-Catholics" into the Catholic Church. The "Anglo-Catholics" are so tolerant already of divergences of religious belief in their own fold that further difficulties of the same sort are not likely to make much difference. Repeatedly these "crises" have turned out to be storms in a tea-cup, and the present one has no features of vital difference from the many that have preceded it.

According to a published statement, "momentous" decisions will have to be taken by the bishops now sitting in conclave, but even if they do come to pass, Catholics will not be inclined to view them seriously, for the simple reason that the Anglican body does not take itself seriously. "Momentous" decisions have been made in the past, but that has not prevented those who do not agree with them from continuing to do things the way they chose. Verbal condemnations follow, of course, but there, in the main, the matter rests.

Little Flower Shrine In Chicago is Visited By 600,000 in 8 Days

Chicago, July 1.—During the week of the Eucharistic Congress, the National Shrine of the Little Flower at the Provincial Carmelite church here was second only to the Cathedral in its attraction for the pilgrims. From Saturday, June 19, until Sunday, June 27 approximately 600,000 paid their respects to the Little Flower at the magnificent new shrine.

Among the pilgrims were Cardinal Dubois, Von Faulhaber and O'Donnell. Forty archbishops, bishop and monsignori, 3,000 priests and 5,000 nuns also were visitors. Each of the cardinals and bishops who visited the shrine spoke in terms of highest admiration of it. The shrine itself is a great monument in marble, gold and bronze, every detail of its cost representing the offering of some devotees of the Little Flower in the United States and Canada in thanksgiving for favors received through the intercession of the saint.

Irish Youths Stay In School Longer

Dublin, July 5.—The Very Rev. P. J. Byrne, S. M., Provincial of the Irish Province of the Marist Fathers, has found that the pupils in the Marist colleges in Ireland now remain at the secondary colleges about two years longer than the boys of ten or fifteen years ago. While fifteen or sixteen was the usual age for withdrawing students from the secondary colleges, that age has now increased to seventeen or eighteen.

The Provincial states that while he had some years ago, at the annual closing ceremonies in his schools, to express his regret at this tendency to take boys from school with a half-finished education, he now has to express his pleasure at the increasing numbers that wait to complete their courses.

Paulist From Coast Received at Vatican

Nun Fatally Hurt In Auto Accident

Holyoke, Mass., July 6.—Sister Louis Mary, stationed at Northampton, died in a hospital here recently as a result of injuries suffered in an automobile accident.

Sister Louis Mary, together with two other nuns, were being taken on an outing in the country by Mr. Cornelius Sullivan, Mr. Sullivan's niece, Miss Elizabeth Sullivan of Northampton, also accompanied them. A collision with another car took place in the village of Whately, and Sister Louis Mary's lung was punctured. Miss Sullivan suffered injuries to her back which, it was believed, would be fatal. The other Sisters suffered only minor injuries.

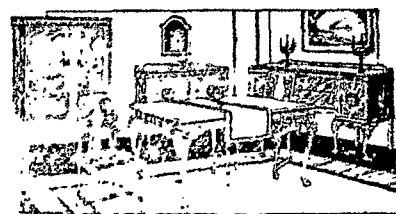
Parish Has There Golden Jubilarians

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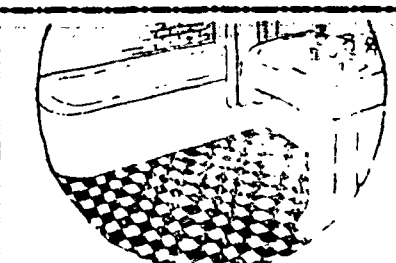
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Sunday Opening Of Exhibition Draws Protests

Harrisburg, July 12.—More than 100 churches and religious organizations have sent protests against the opening of the Sesqui-Centennial Exposition on Sundays to Governor Pinchot.

The protestants base their stand upon the Act of 1794, which is said to be openly disregarded in all communities of Pennsylvania and which the Commonwealth has never made a campaign to enforce.

The New York Sabbath Committee is one of the latest to protest against the fact that the Philadelphia Sesqui-Centennial Exposition is allowed to remain open on Sundays. In a letter to Mayor Kendrick the Committee points out various instances in the past where the United States has observed the Sabbath at International Expositions.

Dedicate Monastery Of the Sacred Heart

Geneva, Ill., July 3.—Impressive ceremonies marked the dedication Sunday of the Sacred Heart Apostolic Monastery, a training school here for missionary priests. The Rt. Rev. G. Vester, M. S. C., missionary Bishop of New Britain, Australia, presided. Following Benediction there was an open-air meeting at which Bishop Vester was the principal speaker.

St. Canisius Church Dedication At Rome Hailed By Germans

Cologne, July 6.—News of the dedication at Rome of the college of the German College to St. Peter Canisius was received with much enthusiasm by all German Catholics. It was long since the desire of the German College, before its transfer from St. Apollinare, where Gregory XIII founded it, to the Hotel Constanti, to dedicate the newly-built church to Peter Canisius, as he and St. Ignatius of Loyola must be regarded as the founders of the college.

As the canonization of St. Peter Canisius did not take place until after Ascension Day, 1925, it was impossible to consecrate the church of the college in honor of its principal founder until this year. Numbers of German priests and prelates included among whom were several cardinals and bishops, and a large delegation of German civil authorities were present at the consecration of the church, together with 100 theologians of the German College, known as "The Red Crayfishes," because of their scarlet gowns.
