**Arrested Priest Is Not Of Roman Catholic Faith**

New York, July 23.—Phillip A. Goodwin, who describes himself as a priest of the American Catholic Church, was arraigned in the West Side Court on Monday and held without bail as a fugitive from California, where he is charged with murder.

For several months Goodwin, who asserts that he is the chaplain of Bishop Gregory Lines of the Los Angeles diocese of the American Catholic Church, has been endeavoring to book a one-act play, "The Double Cross," in vaudeville, and has appeared in the piece several times on theaters of the Loew circuit.

A telegram from the Sheriff of San Bernardino County, California, asking that Goodwin be arrested, but giving no details of the murder with which he is charged, said the man was posing "as a Catholic priest." Goodwin, however, does not pretend ever to have been a priest of any religious body except the American Catholic Church. This is an organization formed some forty years ago and incorporated ten years ago with the announced purpose of bringing together those interested in the "Old Catholic" movement. In spite of its name, its presiding bishop lives in France. Dr. Lines, in the Bishop's name, has headquarters at Los Angeles.

**Campaign To Assist Anglican Converts To Catholic Church**

London, July 12.—Having in mind the possibility that many Anglican clergymen will be seeking admission to the Catholic Church in the course of the next few years, the Converts' Aid Society here has inaugurated a national campaign to increase the membership.

The society relieves the distress of ex-ministers and their families after their reception. Many of the clergymen give up all they have in the world to become Catholics. Their training has left them unfitted for a commercial career, and some have been known to sell their homes bit by bit to keep body and soul together.

Ex-Anglican nuns also are helped. One who was recently found in a destitute condition had been in a Protestant convent for 34 years.

**Will Honor Leaders Of Chicago Congress**

**Cardinal Gibbons Institute Names 3 New Trustees**

Washington, July 23.—It was reported to the board of trustees of the Cardinal Gibbons Institute, at Ridge, Md., which has for its aim the education of colored youth, at its annual meeting just held, that 60 boys and girls from six states and the District of Columbia attended classes during the year just closed. The ages ranged from 14 to 26 years and the grades from the seventh through the Junior high school. In addition to academic work, all were enrolled in trade preparatory courses, with the greater number preferring agriculture.

The meeting filled several vacancies on the board by the election of P. H. O'Neill, of Los Angeles, one of the leading Catholics of the Pacific Coast; Charles H. Dolle, Secretary of the N. C. C. M., and H. M. Taliaferro of Clinton, Md.

The officers were reelected. They are the Most Rev. Michael J. Curley, Archbishop of Baltimore, president; Admiral William S. Benson, U. S. N., retired, first vice-president and chairman of the executive committee; William Aumen, second vice-president; A. C. Monahan, executive secretary; L. P. Williams, treasurer; and Eugene A. Clark and Miss Caroline Cook, members of the executive committee.

**New \$275,000 Church Is Begun at St. Louis; 8,000 At Ceremonies**

St. Louis, July 23.—Archbishop Glennon officiated at the laying of the cornerstone of the new St. Engelbert's church on Sunday afternoon. He was assisted by the pastor, the Rev. A. L. Van Brun, and the Rev. F. C. Eckhof, assistant pastor. About 30 priests from other parishes were present.

The arrival of the archbishop was signaled by a parade through the neighboring streets, in which a large number of societies and sodalities of men and women took part. Archbishop Glennon made a brief address in which he congratulated the pastor and people on their undertaking. The Rev. Joseph F. Lubeley, pastor of Holy Trinity Church, preached the sermon before an audience numbering about 8,000. The new edifice is to cost about \$275,000 when complete.
