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**Deaf of Rochester
Diocese to Celebrate
Feast Day Sunday**

Next Sunday, August 8, is the Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost. Among the Catholic Deaf, this Sunday is familiarly known as "Ephpheta Sunday." It is so called by them from the word "Ephpheta" occurring in the Gospel of the Sunday. By that word, Our Saviour miraculously cured the deaf and dumb man. Throughout the Catholic World, the sweet and touching story of this miracle will be heard next Sunday, from the reading of the Gospel at Holy Mass.

"Ephpheta Sunday" is especially dear to the Catholic Deaf because it is their own "Patronal Feast." On June 13, 1916, Pope Pius X, of blessed memory, selected and appointed this so-called "Ephpheta Sunday," as the Patronal Feast of the Deaf, and granted a Plenary Indulgence to the Deaf and their Benefactors on that day by going to confession and receiving Holy Communion. This special Feast Day will be commemorated and celebrated in a most solemn manner, wherever the Catholic Deaf are to be found.

Our own Catholic Deaf of the Rochester Diocese are going to join heart and soul, in this universal and special celebration. At a quarter to nine A. M., next Sunday, they are going to assemble in St. Joseph's Church, on Franklin Street near North Clinton Avenue. At 9 o'clock, they will hear Holy Mass and go to Holy Communion in a body. Rev. Father Charles Burger, C.S.S.R., who has the spiritual care of the Deaf of the Rochester Diocese, will explain the Mass to his beloved Parishioners whilst another priest is saying it and recite all prayers, before and after Holy Communion, with them. At the last general Communion during the Paschal Season, Father Burger used only signs as a favor to the graduates of the Buffalo School. Next Sunday, he will only use the manual-alphabet or "finger-spelling method" to favor the graduates of the Rochester School. Irrespective of which method of communication with the Deaf is superior, Father Burger, like all other Catholic Priests in this special field of labor, uses the so-called "combination method," namely signing, spelling, speaking, writing and any other imaginable and practical means of communication, conducive to the eternal salvation of his afflicted people.

After the Mass, Father Burger will lead his beloved Parishioners, two by two over to St. Joseph's Hall, where breakfast will be served gratis, and a social and family-like reunion held.

Through this popular and standard Catholic Weekly, Father Burger publicly asks and begs all its readers to make known to him, by writing the names and addresses of any Catholic Deaf living in or about Rochester. Many parents, from false shame, are keeping their children of this class at home, when the said children ought to be in their own special and Catholic schools, which, by the way are run on a high standard and efficient system. By the word "deaf" above, is meant not "hard-of-hearing" persons but only those who were formerly known as "deaf-mutes."

In Fall, Father Burger hopes to place a Basket Ball Team in the field of sports. The team will be known as the "C. D. M." or "Catholic Deaf-Mutes." Application for membership will be made into Rochester's Catholic Basket Ball League. Father Burger says his worryment of the team lies not in the material or timber of the team, nor in the selection of the players, but chiefly and principally in the supply and furnishing of the Basket Ball Suits. The Treasury was always slim and lean and its "rock bottom" ever visible. His own "good ship" as they say, was at last coming across, but, unfortunately, it struck an iceberg and sank.

**Monsignor Hendrick
To Celebrate 49th
Anniversary**

On Friday morning at 8:30 o'clock, Rt. Rev. Monsignor Joseph W. Hendrick of Geneva, N. Y., will celebrate mass at St. Francis de Sales Church in commemoration of the forty-ninth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. Monsignor Hendrick was ordained at the Convent of the Sacred Heart in Rochester by the late Bishop Bernard McQuaid, at the time his sister, Charlotte Hendrick was a resident at the convent and as his sister was in a cloistered convent the ordination service, was moved there in order that she might be present.

Monsignor Hendrick was born in Penn Yan and studied in the grammar school and academy there. He later attended French colleges in St. Hyacinth and Montreal and took his seminary course at St. Joseph's Seminary in Troy. He was ordained on August 6, 1877. After his ordination he served a brief period at the Cathedral and at St. Mary's Church in Rochester. He then was stationed at Auburn, Clyde and Spencerport. For six years afterwards he was pastor at Stanley and Rushville and after spending fourteen years as pastor at Livonia, Livingston county, and Honeoye Falls, Monroe county, he was sent to Ovid. He also served as Catholic Chaplain at the Willard State Hospital. In October, 1917, he was assigned to the irremovable rectorship of St. Francis de Sales Church, Geneva, by Bishop Hickey, and made dean of the district.
