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Tuxedo Prominent as Paris Fashion

Double-Breasted Suit for Women's Wear Is Practically Ignored.

Concerted effort of Parisian designers to popularize for feminine evening wear the metallic fabric tuxedo is "smoking," as they classify it, is exerting an unexpected influence on the tailored styles. The double-breasted suit for general wear is practically ignored here, says a Paris fashion correspondent in the New York Times, the Parisian tailored suit being designed almost like the masculine single-breasted dinner jacket. It has the long rolled silk lapel and is made with the exaggerated form-fitting waistline Frenchmen affect.

The skirt is usually plaited, though certain models made in black cheviot throughout, have narrow, straight skirts, braided on the side seams as trousers are braided and pressed with a line down either front, in imitation of trouser pressings. The skirt with this very earnest garment is as soberly masculine as the suit, and the collar is of the stiff, wing variety. The suit gains in distinction from the wrap worn over it—a wrap that is very much in vogue, copied to the last detail after a man's flowing opera cape.

As a rule, however, the tuxedo for the street is not so faithful in its masculine details. Usually the plaited skirt is in a lighter or darker material than the coat, a checked navy blue and white skirt with a plain dark-blue coat being especially favored. Shirts and collars are of soft silk and are not too strictly tailored. Tuxedos in the Paris collections are designed primarily for semi-formal evening wear and are made accordingly in the most brilliant metallic fabrics, though some few, for the daintier or late afternoon are of cloth trimmed only with lace. Yvonne Davidson makes one of these less conspicuous models in peach-beige kasha with the usual tuxedo jacket and a skirt with fullness concentrated in a cluster of inverted plaits at the center front. The jacket reveals its splendor only when it is opened. It is lined with a white-gold lame used for the revers as well. The blouse with this suit is of gold lame with a ruff collar and cuffs made of the lame in the tiniest of plaitings.

Quite in line with the idea of creating evening costumes always as component parts of an ensemble, Jenny has made a cavalier cape of emerald-green velvet lined in gold lame and collared in Russian sable to wear over her "smoking" costume. The jacket of this suit is in gold lame with a green under-tone, and the skirt is of plaited gold cloth. The blouse worn under the jacket is of fine handkerchief linen, with a stock collar and ruffled gilet of the same material edged with lace.

There is evident in the newest bathing suits an inclination to define the figure with a slightly shaped bodice or tunic, and to give a little fullness to the skirt, however short, says a Paris fashion correspondent. This is done usually with an inverted plait at each side, in some models of crepe or in taffeta a cluster of gathers.

The head covering for bathing and the beach is uncommonly attractive this season. A few smart little shapes in leather, rubberized material and silk are shown for women who dress more for the sun bath and beach promenade than for swimming. All of them in pretty flower colors. In very expensive garments, clocks are embroidered and an elastic garter, which becomes a part of the garment, is inset above the knee, but it contains no rubber, it is merely a tightly woven section like the tops of some socks for men.

Fobs Back in New Guise; Suspended From Bar Pin

Fobs have come back, but in a new guise. The new fob is suspended from a bar pin, usually of rhinestones. A fob of grosgrain ribbon hanging from a bar of rhinestones attached to the breast pocket of the tailored suit adds a smart tone to the costume. But fobs are also worn with dressy afternoon frocks, and for this purpose they are of crystal in white or combined with colored stones.

For the popular black and white costume, there are fobs of white crystals with the bar in onyx, closely set with rhinestones. With an afternoon dress the fob is worn on the left side a little below the shoulder.

Gold Broche Underdress

How Bees Get Honey

How Sunspots Affect Us

Sunspots are fascinating things to study. For many years past it puzzled science to account for them, writes J. A. Lloyd, M.B.A., F.R.S., an English scientist. They are now believed to be immense whirlpools in the atmosphere of hot metallic vapors around the sun. In these vortices, ionized particles are whirled at high velocity, and send out streams of electrical energy in all directions.

Evidently, therefore, sunspots are the scenes of violent disturbances which tear asunder the sun's outer casing. Through the hole thus formed we can peer down into the darker interior.

How Fish Are Warned

Washing of the waves and noise of the surf serves as a radio beacon to warn fishes to keep under the surface in rough weather and stay away from shore, according to Dr. Austin H. Clark, of the United States National Museum.

The hissing sound of breaking waves has a marked directive quality, according to Doctor Clark, and it is easy to locate the origin of the disturbance.

How to Find North Star

The North star can nearly always be found on a clear night by means of the "pointers," two stars in the constellation called the Dipper, scientifically known as Ursa Major, the Great Bear. The Dipper consists of seven stars, three making up the handle and four the cup or bowl. The pointers are the two stars farthest from the handle—Exchange.

How to Clean White Paint

One of the best ways to clean white paint is to dip a piece of soft flannel cloth in warm water, wring it out and then dip it in clean kerosene, using this to rub the paint. The friction of the kerosene will remove the stain without injuring the paint.

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
