Catholic Women's Club

Early in September the Catholic Women's Club will establish a new club house at No. 117 Ormond street, formerly No. 1 Franklin square.

Two large offices on the first floor will be used by the club to conduct its business, leaving the residence portion of the house to be used for club activities.

The club was organized about seven years ago when a body of women met at St. Elizabeth's Guild House in Field street on the invitation of Mrs. Mary F. Nier, and in 1922 the club was incorporated. At present it has about five thousand members representative of every walk of life for women.

Four presidents have guided the club during its existence, Miss Katherine L. Van Alstyne, Miss Frances A. Fox, Miss Cecilia M. Yawman and Mrs. M. H. Keogh now in office. They have been assisted by twenty-four directors elected by the members each year.

In addition to the social life for its members, the club has been active in some of the welfare work of the city which is supported by the Community Chest. It also maintains a camp on Canandaigua lake for its girl members and conducts a summer school for children in the northeastern part of the city.

Rev. Leo DeSmet, Hero Of Boxer Rebellion, Dead

The Rev. Leo DeSmet, hero of the Boxer uprising in China, knighted by the Belgian king for his valor in defending Christians, died last Monday after an illness of three months. His funeral was held Wednesday at 10 a. m. at his parish church in Constableville, N. Y. Rt. Rev. Joseph Conroy, bishop of Ogdensburg, officiated.

Born in Audenarde, Belgium, 53 years ago, Father DeSmet received his education and was ordained to the priesthood in Europe. He volunteered as a missionary in China and spent 14 years in Mongolia.

He was in the midst of the Boxer Rebellion of 1900 and served until seriously wounded. His valor brought official recognition and knighthood from his king. On his recovery he was retired from the missionary service of his church and returned to Belgium.

Then he came to the United States and affiliated with the diocese of Ogdensburg. He had pastorates at Fulton and Rosaire, N. Y., before his assignment to Constableville. Three months ago his health failed again and he was brought to St. Mary's.

He was a familiar figure to many Rochesterians, an intimate associate of many Rochester prelates.

St. Boniface Commandery To Celebrate 50th Anniversary

Rice of Clinton, Kan., formerly of Rochester, and a member of St. Boniface Commandery, this city. At the conclusion of the services the commandery, under Captain Wendel Maeder, will put on an exhibition drill and dress parade in front of the church on Gregory Street.

Monday morning, Sept. 13, there will be a memorial mass at 7 o'clock for deceased members of the commandery. The celebration will close with a banquet for members, their wives or lady friends and members of the Ladies' Auxiliary at the banquet hall of St. Boniface School on Whallin Street.
