

Bishop Hickey Dedicates New Parish School

The new Immaculate Conception parochial school building was dedicated last Sunday afternoon by Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, bishop of Rochester, and other prominent members of the clergy.

Members of the reception committee, who had planned for a large crowd, were astonished by the number of people who visited the school between 3 and 9 o'clock, when it was open for inspection. At the dedication ceremony, which started at 4:30 o'clock, following a procession of priests and prominent members of the parish through the corridors, the assembly hall, seating more than 1,000, was filled to capacity, many also attended the blessing of the class rooms and the statue of the Immaculate Conception at 4 o'clock.

In his dedication address, Bishop Hickey outlined the aims of Catholic education and stressed the part which the new school would play not only in educating the youth of the parish, but in serving as a center of community life. Such a school, where the principles of patriotism were foremost, would, he declared, serve as a monument to God and country, as well as to education and the parish which built it. Bishop Hickey was introduced by Rev. Joseph S. Cameron, rector of the Church of the Immaculate Conception.

The blessing of the flag, raised on the sixty-foot flag pole on the Edinburgh street side of the building, took place at 5 o'clock. Following the ceremonies, Bishop Hickey and seventy-five priests of the diocese were entertained at supper at the school.

Band concerts given by the Immaculate Conception Cadet Band from 3 until 4 o'clock and from 7 until 8 o'clock drew a large attendance.
