London, Sept. 10.—Lieut. Col. W. A. Ince Anderson, who died this week, had three martyrs among his ancestors. One of them, the Venerable Robert Anderson may be beatified this year.

Col. Anderson had no children, and his brother, Sir Francis Anderson, K. C. S. G., former chairman of the London County Council, becomes the new squire of Euxton, the family seat in Lancashire.

Father F. Bettels, Of St. Louis, Dead

St. Louis, September 11.—Funeral services for the Rev. Francis Bettels, for 20 years pastor of St. Bernard's Church, here who died last Sunday night after a lingering illness, were held Wednesday morning at St. Bernard's Church. Father Bettels was 76 years old.

Msr. F. G. Holweck, vicar general of the Archdiocese of St. Louis was celebrant of the solemn Requiem Mass said for Father Bettels. He was assisted by the Rev. Frederick J. Schlattmann as deacon and the Rev. Anthony F. Schuermann as sub-deacon. Archbishop Glennon and many members of the St. Louis clergy attended. Burial was in St. Peter and Paul Cemetery.

Father Bettels was born at Hildesheim, Germany, July 3, 1850. He came to America when he was 14 years old and was ordained in 1876. He celebrated the golden jubilee of his priesthood on July 4, last.

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Weekly Calendar Of Feast Days

Sunday, September 26.—Sts. Cyprian and Justina, Martyrs. St. Cyrian was brought up in all the idolatrous mysteries of astrology and the black art. He was converted when Justina, a young Christian lady, through prayer, defeated his infernal influences. She was scourged inhumanly and he torn with iron hooks under the persecution of Diocletian. Later both were beheaded.

Monday, September 27.—Sts. Cosmas and Damian, Martyrs, were brothers born in Arabia. Under Diocletian they were bound hand and foot and cast into the sea because of their Faith.

Tuesday, September 28.—St. Wenceslas, martyr, was the son of a Duke of Bohemia. His father was a Christian but his mother a hard, cruel pagan. Wenceslas ruled as a brave, pious king, despite his mother's opposition to Christians. His brother, his mother's ally, martyred him while he prayed before the tabernacle.

Wednesday, September 29.—St. Michael, Archangel, "Mi-ca-el", or "Who is like to God?" Such was the cry of the great Archangel when he smote the rebel Lucifer in the conflict of the heavenly hosts, and from that hour he was known as "Michael" the captain of the armies of God.

Thursday, September 30.—St. Jerome, Doctor, was born in Dalmatia, in 329, and was sent to school at Rome. He was possessed of a great mind and Christ called him to His work. After four years in the desert the Pope summoned him to Rome, and there put the now famous Hebrew scholar to the task of revising the Latin Bible.

Friday, October 1.—St. Remigius, Bishop, was born of noble and pious parents. He was acclaimed Archbishop of Rheims at the age of 22, despite the canons and his own reluctance. He confronted King Clovis, converted and baptized him at Christmas 496. He died in 533 after an episcopate of 74 years.

Saturday, October 2.—The Holy Guardian Angels. Our Lord says in the Gospel, "Beware lest ye scandalize any of these little ones, for their angels in heaven see the face of My Father". The existence of Guardian Angels is, hence, a dogma of the Christian Faith.

CHARLES J. CULLINAN.

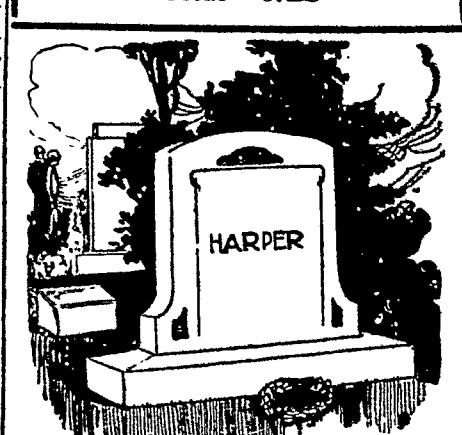
