

Dante Dramatic Club To Present Play For Benefit of Missions

The Dante Dramatic Club of St. Joseph's Commercial Alumni Association are presenting their play, "Am I Intruding?" a three act comedy drama of mystery by Frederick G. Johnson, at St. Joseph's Hall on Franklin street on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings, October 19, 20 and 21st for the benefit of the Porto Rican Missions. It is directed by Joseph C. Durbin and under management of Cleto Lochner.

At the last few rehearsals, "Am I Intruding?" revealed itself as a thoroughly modern comedy, causing laughter galore, based on a mystery plot that holds the attention from start to finish and comes out quite differently from what anyone is expecting. There is no one predominating part, all the players in the cast having unusual opportunities to shine as individuals. The ease and naturalness with which the players go through their roles is remarked upon, and reflect credit upon the ability of Joseph C. Durbin, director of the production.

Throughout the entire three acts, the rapid action brings about one situation after another, in which are mingled thrills, laughs, and surprises. The comedy is natural, not forced, the characters have the little mannerisms which we see about us in everyday life, and the interest is well sustained until the final curtain.

Obtain Loan To Finance K. of C. Bldg.

Rochester Knights of Columbus have completed negotiations with the Prudence Company of New York, a mortgage firm, for loan of one million dollars on first mortgage to complete the building at Chestnut and Lawn streets. Contracts will be let and completion of the structure is expected Sept. 1, 1927. No change in plans will be made except that the top eight stories of the twelve-story building will be used as dormitories for young men instead of offices. The structure has a frontage of 195 feet in Chestnut Street and 264 feet in Lawn Street.

The loan was obtained by Rochester Knights of Columbus Building Association, Inc., and Rochester Council, K. of C., will rent quarters from that organization.

Besides an auditorium and gallery, seating three thousand, there will be a gymnasium, swimming pool, bowling hall, with spectator gallery, and locker rooms. The main floor of the auditorium, with removable seats, will be used for basketball and dances and rented.

Cost of the completed structure and the balance of the money will be upwards of a million dollars obtained by the collection of building campaign subscriptions.
