Weekly Calendar Of Feast Days

Sunday, Oct. 24.—St. Magloire, Bishop, was born in Brittany towards the end of the fifth century, a cousin of St. Sampson, Magloire, with his father, mother and two brothers, resolved to fly the world, give their goods to the poor and the Church. Magloire and his father attached themselves to Sampson's monastery. When more than 70 years old Magloire founded a monastery of 60 monks on the Isle of Jersey. He died in 575.

Monday, October 25.—Sts. Crispin and Crispinian, martyrs, where called from Rome to preach the Faith in Gaul toward the middle of the third century. The brothers amazed the infidels by the example of their lives but suffered most cruel torture and finally death by the sword in 287 after accusations had been made against them and the emperor sought to gratify their accusers.

Tuesday, October 26.—St. Evaristus, Pope and Martyr, succeeded St. Anacletus in the See of Rome in the reign of Trajan and after governing the Church nine years, died in 112. The institution of Cardinal priests is ascribed to him by some because he first divided Rome into several titles of parishes, assigning a priest to each.

Wednesday, October 27.—St. Frumentius, Bishop, was one of two children spared in a massacre of a ship's company by barbarians. The king before whom they were taken liked them immediately and put them in his service. St. Frumentius became Bishop of the Ethiopians and gained great numbers for the Faith.

Thursday, October 28.—Sts. Simon and Jude, Simor was a simple Galilean, called by Christ to be a pillar of His Church. The apostle Jude was a brother of St. James the Less. They were called "brethren of the Lord" because of their relationship to the Blessed Virgin.

Friday, October 29.—St. Narcissus, Bishop, was consecrated Bishop of Jerusalem about the year 180, when already an old man. Praying over water drawn from a well, he brought about its change into oil, which the faithful feared they would have no oil for their lamps on the paschal feast. His very virtue made him enemies and he was charged with the most atrocious crimes. God defended him, however, and his accusers suffered the penalties they had invoked for him. He died in extreme old age.

Saturday, October 30.—St. Marcellus, the Centurion, Martyr. Marcellus, a Christian centurion, refused to participate in the impious celebration of Emperor Maximilian Herculeus' birthday. He proclaimed publicly that he was a soldier of Jesus Christ, the Eternal King. He was arrested, imprisoned and beheaded October 30, 298. Cassian, the secretary or notary who refused to write the death sentence, claiming it to be unjust, was beheaded on December
