**Catholic Lectures
In Congregational
Church On Religion**

Washington, Oct. 25. The Rev. Moses R. Lovell, pastor of the Mt. Pleasant Congregational Church here, opened an unusual series of meetings at his church recently. There are to be twelve gatherings in the series, in the course of which the various religious faiths are to be discussed by representatives of different churches and by the pastor. The move is announced as directed toward the better understanding of one another.

**Rev. W. Mulder, S. J.,
Rector of Nymegen
Catholic University**

Louvain, Oct. 23.—The Catholic University of Nymegen, following the traditions of the State Universities of Holland, chooses every year a new rector from among the members of its professorial body. The rector for the first year of its existence was a secular priest, Msgr. Schrymen. He was succeeded by a Dominican father, the Very Rev. de Langer Wendels. Last year's was a Jesuit, Father Raaymakers. This year's is again a Jesuit Father, the Very Rev. W. Mulder.
The transfer of powers is carried on with great solemnity. After a Solemn Mass of thanksgiving the professors, students and friends assemble in one of the university halls for the official ceremony of abdication and assumption of powers. It is all preceded by a discourse from the retiring rector, which is a review of the striking events at the school during his term of office. From Father Raaymakers' discourse, we culled the following:
The University opened three years ago with 189 students for the three faculties of theology, of philosophy and letters, and of law. Natural sciences and medicine are not yet taught, for want of funds to install the necessary equipments of these costly branches. Two years ago there were 288 students, and last year 327.

**Card. Hayes To Get
\$5,000 Under Will
Bestowing \$117,000**

Morristown, N. J., October 23.—The will of Bernard F. Coleman, formerly of Madison, N. J., who died in New York a year ago, which was recorded here, gives \$100,000 for the erection of the Catholic church and rectory at Croton, N. Y., in memory of his parents, brothers and sisters. The entire estate is to be divided among relatives, and Catholic priests and charities.
Cardinal Hayes will receive \$5,000 and the Rev. Constantine Cassanelli of the Bronx, \$10,000. Msgr. Michael J. Lavelle of St. Patrick's Cathedral is given \$1,000. A like amount was bequeathed to the Rev. John E. Lambert, rector of St. Vincent's Church in Madison, who has since died. The Little Sisters of the Poor, the Servants of Relief of Incurable Cancer, at Hawthorne, N. Y.; All Souls Hospital in Morristown and St. Mary's Orphan Asylum in Newark are charitable foundations which benefit by the will.
