

New Nazareth College Ground To Be Broken In Spring

In the spring ground will be broken for a new Nazareth College building in East avenue, near the Rochester Country Club. Although there are women's colleges in this country larger than present plans indicate this will be, the proposed structure "will be quite comparable in dignity and beauty."

The material will be brick, and the design English Gothic. One hundred and eighty acres of land has been purchased, and the first buildings planned with a view to permit of expansion as the college grows. Sister Teresa Marie, dean, said that the Community of Sisters of St. Joseph is providing the funds, "precisely how much, she declined to estimate. It is expected the school will be finished in time for its first graduating class, one year later."

The drawings call for a dormitory to accommodate nearly one hundred boarding pupils, while the college will be able to care for some five hundred students in all. A mother house, where members of the faculty and other nuns of the order will live, will be on the campus. More teachers will be engaged as the college expands, provision being made at once for three hundred or four hundred sisters in the mother house.

The college now has a secretarial course, and one of the first new courses to be added at the new site will be a course in home economics. Nazareth has in its curriculum a normal course for which an A. B. degree and a college-graduate-teacher's certificate are awarded. The college is in its third year and has seventy-one pupils. Fifteen are juniors. Nazareth draws pupils from many towns in Western New York, outside of Rochester.

Plans for the new building call for a structure four stories in height, handsome and imposing. Wings will be on either side of the main building. A library, gymnasium, laboratory, and auditorium, as well as kitchens and a large cafeteria, will be included.

This college is an outgrowth of the academy bearing the same name. For years the academy was in Jay street, before it occupied the present structure, in Lake avenue. The college has thus far been conducted in a remodeled private house on grounds adjoining those of the academy.

The second of a series of activities inaugurated by the three classes of the present student body of Nazareth College to obtain a fund for furnishing the new addition took place Wednesday evening, when the Junior class gave a card party at the college. About two hundred persons were present.

St. Patrick's Church, Danville, Celebrates 75th Anniversary

Danville.—St. Patrick's Church celebrated its seventy-fifth anniversary Nov. 1. There was a solemn high mass at 10:30, at which Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Hickey of Rochester officiated, assisted by the Rev. John A. Sullivan of St. John the Evangelist, Rochester; the Rev. Simon FitzSimons of St. Mary's, Rochester; the Rev. Michael G. Wall, of St. Agnes' Church, Avon.

The first Catholic church in this section was on Sandy Hill, built by a number of German immigrants in 1826. The first priest to visit Danville was the Rev. P. Frost of Rochester in the early '80s. Mass was said in the homes at first and later in the town hall. The cornerstone of St. Mary's was laid in 1845 by German Catholics, assisted by the few Irish families then living here.

St. Patrick's cornerstone was not laid until 1849 by the Rev. Edward O'Flaherty, who was sent to Danville by Bishop Timon, shortly after he was appointed bishop of the new diocese of Buffalo in 1847. Colonel Nathaniel Rochester had made a present of the church square to the people of Danville during his residence here in 1814. It was in charge of the United Society. A. C. Woodruff, banker and mill owner, outlined a plan by which they might secure a building plot.

St. Patrick's Church was finished and dedicated by the Rev. Charles Tierney in 1851. It was obliged in shape with a dry goods box for an altar. There were not many seats and when the visitors came to the services from the Jackson Health Resort they brought their chairs with them.

In 1871 Bishop Bernard McQuaid of Rochester appointed the Rev. Michael Higgins for St. Patrick's at the solicitation of some of the parishioners. He was succeeded by the Rev. Simon FitzSimons. He was succeeded in 1883, after the new parochial school he built had been opened, by the Rev. James T. Dougherty, who served eight years. On his removal to Canandaigua, the Rev. William T. Dunn came here in 1901. The Rev. M. C. Wall's pastorate continued twelve years. He was transferred to Avon and the Rev. John E. Masseth took up his work.

Father Masseth has reconstructed the church into the Spanish-mission architecture and many beautiful gifts have helped to beautify the interior and exterior of St. Patrick's.

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Carmelites Will Have A Monastery In Altoona Diocese

Altoona, Pa., Oct. 27.—A Carmelite monastery soon will be founded in the diocese of Altoona by nuns, having faced almost impossible conditions in France, have accepted the invitation of the Rt. Rev. J. J. McCort, Bishop of Altoona, to establish themselves here.

Mother Mary of the Divine Heart, prioress of the new Carmelite nunnery, is the late Most Rev. Placide Louis Chappelle, Archbishop of New Orleans. Mother Mary spent some years of her youth in this country. Post war conditions in France are such that it is virtually impossible for the contemplative religious, once exiled from their country, to take up life again with any promising outlook. The Carmelites, who are coming to the diocese of Altoona, found refuge in Belgium when they were driven out of France. Returning at the close of the war they faced dire and pestilence.

The Angeles is the Catholic name of honoring God in perfect union and evening by perfect love. Mother Mary, together with other Carmelite nuns, will be coming to the diocese of Altoona and will be settling in the town of the Immaculate.
