

Two More Mexican Bishops Driven Into Exile Or Hiding

Mexico City, Nov. 12.—Two more members of the Catholic Episcopate have been added to the ever-rising list of those either under arrest or driven into exile or hiding by the Calles Government.

Archbishop Francisco Orozco Jimenez, of Guadalajara, is the prelate forced into hiding, and Bishop Juan Navarrete, of Sonora, is the prelate exiled.

Archbishop Orozco disappeared from his residence, and immediately grave anxiety was felt; rumors sprang up that he had been arrested and spirited away.

Archbishop chooses to hide himself. Shortly afterward, however, there appeared a notice bearing his Grace's signature and explaining his disappearance to his spiritual flock.

Immediately the Government, despite its previous record of arresting bishops on flimsy charges, intimated that there was intent to arrest Archbishop Orozco.

Bishop Navarrete, of Sonora, was exiled in a wholly illegal manner and by trickery. He had been invited to preach at a Solemn Mass in Nogales, Arizona.

Upon his arrival in Nogales, however, Bishop Navarrete learned that the Government had charged him with sedition in connection with the Yaqui insurrection.

Bishop's Protest to Governor. Thereupon he wrote a formal protest to Senator Leandro Gaxiola, Governor of Sonora.

"As a man of conscience and a citizen in full use of my rights, I protest before the people of Sonora and before the whole Mexican people against this decree of yours, illegal in its source, illegal in its procedure and absolutely unjustifiable.

"I am greatly astonished that a government which lays claim to obedience and respect should convert itself into a mafia in dealing with citizens who have the whole of society as witnesses to their honor, labor and respect for legitimately constituted authority.

"I, therefore, take the liberty of informing you that I do not recognize your order . . . and that I define any moral or social responsibility for the results which may ensue from your procedure.

Bishop Navarrete also sent to his flock a pastoral letter in which he described the circumstances of his exile and his protest.

civilized people. "But in case you might have any lingering doubt as to the use I have made of my authority, I take good witness that my conscience does not accuse me of the most insignificant failure in observing the laws which govern us, tyrannical and unjust as they are.

In conclusion, Bishop Navarrete exhorted his flock to pray for peace, be charitable toward their persecutors, remain true to their Faith and flee from any method of defense which would cause bloodshed or fratricidal hatred.

In addition to these further persecutions of the Hierarchy, three priests have been brought to Mexico City from Chihuahua, where they were arrested charged with officiating privately, at religious services.

Faithful Behind With Church Dues Suable In France

Exreuz, Nov. 3.—In a study of the "Denier du Culte," as the contributions to the support of the Church are known in France, the "Semaine Religieuse d'Evreux," official organ of the diocese, publishes an interesting report on the court decisions handed the faithful.

The tribunal of Fontenay sentenced a parishioner to pay a double fee for a funeral ceremony because he did not subscribe to the "Denier du Culte."

The tribunal of Bazas declared that a fee for a religious ceremony may properly provide for a tax for the expense of public worship.

The tribunal of Gaillac affirms that it is permissible for a minister of religion to ask remuneration for his ministry and that the amount thereof may be fixed by the bishop of the diocese.

The tribunal of Montagne has declared that the pastor is free to refuse to perform a ceremony for persons who have not subscribed to the support of the church.

And, more important still, the Court of Cassation, the highest tribunal in France, declares that the pastor has a right to exact an annual contribution for the general expense of worship.

The "Semaine Religieuse" points out that pastors do not generally take advantage of the rights granted them and limit themselves to appealing to the good will of their parishioners.

Irish Protestants Assist St. Vincent Society Haul Coal

Dublin, Nov. 2.—Messrs. Wordie & Co., Carriers, and Messrs. Eason & Son, Publishers, two leading non-Catholic business firms in Dublin, have furnished free transport for timber to the St. Vincent de Paul Emergency Fuel Depot at City Quay.

The town of Cashel, Tipperary, has had no coal for more than three weeks. The price of turf in the town has risen from \$2 to \$10 a horse load.

Coal merchants in Dublin City who are usually engaged in fighting the Irish Transport and General Workers' Trades Union, are now giving the union the free use of motor lorries for the organization of cheap fuel supplies.

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Irish Free State Ministers Seeking Support Of Clergy

Dublin, Nov. 2.—On their political tour of the West, Ernest Blythe, Minister of Finance and Mr. Hogan, Minister for Lands and Agriculture of the Free State, have, so far as possible, sought the support of the clergy at their meetings.

At a convention of Cumann na Gaedheal delegates, at Swinford, Mayo, the Rev. Msgr. Conington, who presided at a meeting for the ministers, surprised them by candid criticism of inefficiency in the Government Departments of Education and Public Works.

"These Departments are," said Msgr. Conington, "excesses upon an otherwise satisfactory Government." The Monsignor then described how for three years he had been unable to get the Department of Education to provide proper school buildings in his district.

"When the School Attendance Act comes into operation November 1," said Msgr. Conington, "and when parents are prosecuted for not sending their children to school, I myself will go to court and have a lawyer to defend these parents; and I will uphold them in their attitude, that, if proper and sanitary accommodations are not provided for their children, they will refuse to send them to school."

Mr. Blythe displayed great annoyance at the objections of critics who attended the meeting in Swinford, and who suggested that some of the employees in the Government offices had too much spare time, and extravagant salaries.

Monks Remind Liverpool Of Its Catholic History

London, Nov. 10.—A large boat manned by Benedictine monks was rowed to the pierhead at Liverpool and was received by the Lord Mayor and other local dignitaries at the opening of civic week.

A thousand years ago, when St. Wolsten of Worcester was preaching at Bristol against the slave trade to Ireland, Liverpool was only a collection of fishermen's huts.

Civic sermons were preached in all the churches.

Boston College's Debaters Defeat Cambridge U. Team

Boston, Nov. 9.—Boston College has initiated its year's program of 20 debates with teams of leading colleges and universities of this country and Canada with a victory over debaters of Cambridge University, England, now in this country.

The Boston College team upheld the affirmative of the proposition: "Resolved: That this house deprecates the tendency of government to usurp the rights of individuals." They presented a cold, hard, logical argument based on Scholastic ethics.

The decision was rendered by three judges, two of them justices of the Massachusetts Superior Court and one of the Federal District Court, themselves graduates of Amherst, Yale and Harvard respectively.

The victory, in launching this year's program, added greatly to the college's prestige. Last year Boston College defeated the teams representing seven American colleges and universities. It lost only to Holy Cross College of Worcester, Mass., another Jesuit institution.

Charity To Profit By Football Game

Chicago, Nov. 10.—Chicago Cardinals and the Kansas City Cowboys, members of the National Professional football league, will play their annual game at Soldier's field, Nov. 28.

All proceeds of the game will be turned over to the Sisters of Mercy Building fund.
