

Jesuits Turn Over Florida Parishes To Salesian Order

Tampa, Fla., Nov. 18.—Because of ever-increasing activities at Sacred Heart Church, Sacred Heart College, in the several missions under their charge, and the planning of a great endowed high school, about to be erected, the Jesuit Fathers of Tampa have turned over two Ybor City parishes, Our Lady of Mercy and Most Holy Name, to the Salesian Fathers who have come to Florida to undertake the work.

The coming of the Salesians in Florida is another step in the progress of the Church here. They will direct their efforts toward improving the material and intellectual, as well as the spiritual welfare of the Ybor City parishioners, and under their direction the work of the Jesuits, so solidly founded, should flourish and prosper even as the state itself has.

The superior of the Salesian Fathers, who is director and pastor of the two churches at Ybor City, is Very Rev. Raymond Bergamo, a distinguished member of the congregation.

Dublin University Begins Year With Solemn High Mass

Dublin, Nov. 18.—His Grace the Archbishop of Dublin, presided at the Solemn High Mass of the Holy Ghost in the University Church, St. Stephen's Green, to mark the opening of the scholastic year in University College, Dublin. The members of the governing body of the University, in their picturesque academic robes, headed a procession of professors, graduates, and students to the Church. Amongst those attending were J. M. O'Sullivan, Free State Minister for Education and professor of history in University College, Professor Michael Hayes, (Speaker of the Dail), Professor J. MacNeill, T. D., Professor Michael Tierney, T. D., Professor W. Magennis, T. D., Senator H. L. Barnville, the distinguished Dublin Surgeon, and Lord Ashbourne.

A choir of students from Holy Cross College, Clonliffe, sang the music of the Mass. Vincent O'Brien, teacher and intimate friend of John McCormack the famous tenor, was organist.

His Grace the Archbishop granted an indulgence of 100 days, under the usual conditions, to those attending the High Mass.

New Home Donated To Card. Dougherty

(By Rev. J. Van der Hayden Philadelphia, Nov. 18.—Announcement was made here that Patrick J. Lawler, prominent contractor of this city, has given to His Eminence Dennis Cardinal Dougherty a large residence and five acres of land on City Line, Merion, directly opposite the new site of St. Joseph's College, now in the course of construction, and only a short distance from the Seminary of St. Charles Borromeo. Cardinal Dougherty has accepted the gift and will move into the house as soon as it is renovated for occupancy.

The property was recently purchased by Mr. Lawler with the purpose of asking the Cardinal to accept it. The spacious stone house containing twenty rooms and six baths, is surrounded by sloping lawns and large trees. There are large stables and garages and two cottages, one for the chauffeur and his family, the other for the gardener.

History lends value to the barns, which stand behind the dwelling, for it was there that a large detachment of Washington's army passed a night sheltered from the winds while on the way to Valley Forge.

The present archiepiscopal residence at 1723 Race street, will become the residence of the Cathedral clergy, and of the Rev. Dr. Hugh L. Lamb, chancellor of the diocese. The present Cathedral rectory at 222 North 18th Street, where the Cardinal will have his offices, will be used exclusively for diocesan affairs, a leading figure in all Catholic activities.

Children Refusing Flag Salute Get Back Into School

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Denver, Colo., Nov. 18.—Fifty children of the Jehovahs who were expelled from the public schools of this city because they refused to salute the flag, an act in violation of their creed, have been readmitted to class by the school board here.

This action has halted a test case which the American Civil Liberties Union was preparing to bring in the Colorado courts. The Jehovahs themselves refused to bring proceedings because litigation is contrary to their religious principles.

The determination of excusable absence from school rests with the local school boards, and that courts may interfere only in cases of abuse. Arthur Garfield Hays and John C. Mahon, for the Free Thinkers, contended that the act violates the constitutional provision for separation of church and state.

Opposing attorneys argued that refusing to permit the children's attendance at religious instructions would be to deny religious liberty and called attention to "the right of the parent to direct the training and nurture the character of the child."

As "one of the most inalienable liberties guaranteed by the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution and by the Bill of Rights." Under the act, children attend the religious classes only with the consent of their parents.

Several church organizations are fighting for the continuance of the religious instruction arrangement.

Catholic Flag For British Empire

London, Nov. 20.—A Catholic flag for the British Empire is a proposal put forward by "Universe," which submits a number of designs for comment.

The French Canadians have a Catholic flag of their own which displays the Sacred Heart, supported by maple leaves in the center of a white cross on a blue ground with fleur-de-lis in the corners—an adaptation of an old French flag.

Dominican Priests, Sailing For China Given Farewells

San Francisco, Nov. 19.—Five Dominican priests sailed from here lately for Fukien, China, on their way to take up their missionary work with the Dominicans already laboring in the Kenning-fu district. They are: Revs. H. A. Burke, O. P.; F. A. Gordon, O. P.; R. E. Brennan, O. P.; S. T. L., Ph. D.; J. M. Barrett, O. P.; and W. F. Cassidy, O. P. S. T. L.

These young priests volunteered for the foreign mission field upon the completion of their theological course and have received special training for the Chinese territory.

Godspeed services have been held for them in various cities in the country during the three weeks prior to their sailing. Among the cities visited by the newly assigned foreign mission priests were: New Haven, Conn.; Providence, R. I.; Lowell, Mass.; Newark, N. J.; Philadelphia, Pa.; New York City, Washington, D. C.; Lima, Ohio; Somers, Ohio; Cincinnati, Ohio; Louisville, Ky.; Memphis, Tenn.; Kansas City, Mo.; and Denver, Colo.

New Courses Added To Paris Institute

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Paris, Nov. 18.—The Catholic Institute of Paris will open this year with several new chairs, one of which will be devoted to the History of Missions. This course will be taught by the eminent historian Georges Goyau. It was founded by a generous donation to the Institute.

There will also be a School of Oriental Languages, splendidly equipped. This department will be divided into two sections, one devoted to the study of Hebrew, Christian Greek, Assyrian, and Egyptian and the second to the study of Arabic, Syriac, Ethiopian, Armenian and Coptic.

Archbishop Shaw Dedicates Hospital

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) New Orleans, Nov. 18.—The new wing of the Leon M. Soniat Memorial Hospital, conducted by the Sisters of Mercy at Metairie, dedicated recently by Most Rev. John W. Shaw, Archbishop of New Orleans, occupies ground which formerly belonged to the Jesuits, and which, after 160 years was returned to the Church and officially accepted by the Archbishop.

The program at the dedicatory exercises included addresses by Archbishop Shaw, the Rev. Albert Biever, S. J., Mayor A. J. O'Keefe of New Orleans, and J. K. Byrne, of the Mercy Hospital board and chairman of the ceremonies.

Aberdeen Diocese Purchases Old Scottish Abbey

London, Nov. 20.—The ruins of the ancient Abbey of Deer, in Aberdeenshire, Scotland, have been purchased by the authorities of the diocese of Aberdeen who will preserve them as a relic of the ecclesiastical life of Scotland in the Middle Ages.

The Abbey of Deer, once an important center of monastic life in northeast Scotland, is now only a picturesque ruin. It was founded and Mass. by William Comyn, Great Justiciary of Scotland, in 1218 or 1219, for the Cistercians. It had a mitred abbot who occupied a seat in the Scottish parliament.

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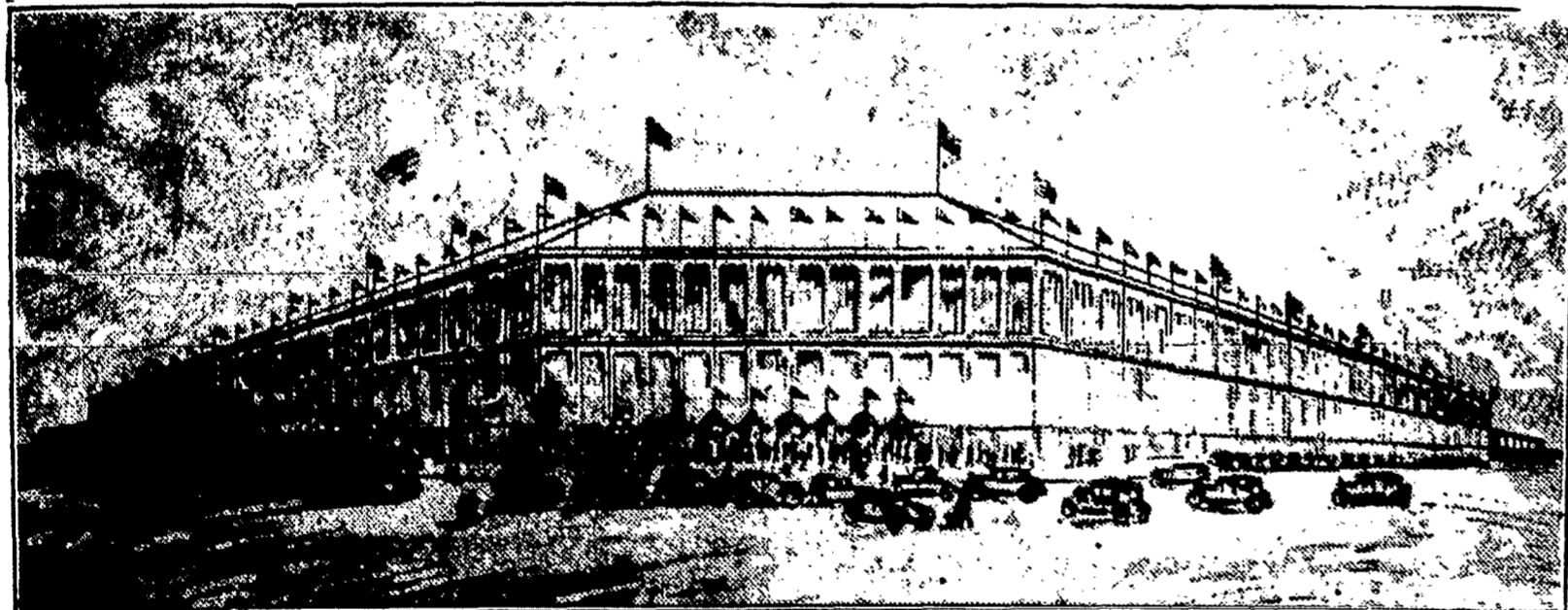
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
