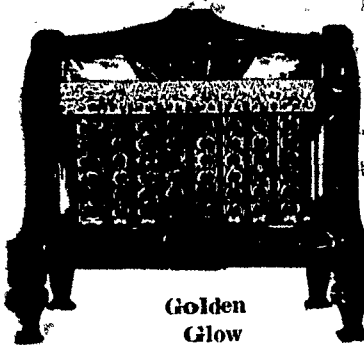


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## Women's Councils Of Three Dioceses To Hold Meetings

 Washington, Jan. 14.—The dates of three annual conventions of diocesan councils of Catholic women to be held within the next few weeks, have just been announced by the National Council of Catholic Women here.

The first of these meetings, the National Council is informed, will be the gathering of the Denver Diocesan Council of Catholic Women at Denver next Tuesday and Wednesday. The Seattle Diocesan Council of Catholic Women will hold its annual meeting at Tacoma, January 24 and 25. The Belleville Diocesan Council of Catholic Women will open its annual meeting at Belleville on February 9.

The Rt. Rev. John J. Cantwell, Bishop of Los Angeles and San Diego, will address one session of the quarterly meeting of the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women to be held in Los Angeles next Friday and Saturday.

## W. F. Fox Created St. Gregory Knight

 Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 10.—Official word has been received here that His Holiness Pope Pius XI has conferred on William F. Fox, Past Supreme Director of the Knights of Columbus, the Order of the Knights of St. Gregory the Great. Mr. Fox is the first citizen of Indianapolis to be so honored.

Mr. Fox has been accorded this distinction in recognition of his labors in behalf of religion and the Christian cause as an official of the Knights of Columbus. The Rt. Rev. Joseph Chartrand, Bishop of Indianapolis, will officiate at the ceremony of investiture which will be held on the evening of January 24 in the Knights of Columbus auditorium, under Knights of Columbus auspices.

The bestowal of this same honor upon Luke Hart of St. Louis, Superior Advocate of the Knights of Columbus, was learned about the same time.

## Reducing Number Of Priests Causes Riots In Zacatecas

Zacatecas, Jan. 14.—The publication of a decree drastically cutting down the number of priests to be permitted in the States of Zacatecas has caused such a hostile reaction among the people that Gen. Eulogia Ortiz, chief of military operations, has been removed because of his incapacity to keep peace in the state. Ortiz has been called "the butcher" because of his ruthless methods, and is generally hated.

The new decree, published by Governor Rodarte, fixes a limit of three priests for the state capital and one for each municipality. In addition, priests functioning in the state must notify the authorities ten days before beginning their ministry. The limitation leaves only one priest for as many as 20,000 Catholics, in some cases.

## Judge M. T. Manton Heads Catholic Club

New York, Jan. 14.—Judge Martin T. Manton, of the Circuit Court of Appeals, was elected president of the Catholic Club at the fifty-sixth annual meeting of the organization here yesterday.

Other officers chosen were Jere B. Sullivan, Judge in the United States Customs Court, first vice-president; John F. Crosby, former Assistant U. S. Attorney General, second vice-president; Arthur H. Gagnon, secretary, and William J. Colahan, treasurer.

## Calles Government Shifts Officials

Mexico City, Jan. 14.—The Attorney General has ordered that all agents of the Federal Public Ministry (Federal court officials) outside Mexico City be moved from their present posts to others, to prevent the formation of local cliques and groups prejudicial to the Government. The reassignments are to take effect this month.

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## Msgr. McNicholas To Preach Retreat

(Cincinnati, O., Jan. 13.—The first retreat for laymen under the auspices of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati will be preached by the Most Rev. John T. McNicholas, O. P., Archbishop of Cincinnati, as was announced by the Archbishop today.

The Retreat Movement has been organized to provide retreats for laymen under the auspices of the Archbishop of Cincinnati. The Crusade Castle, in Ault park, which serves as the national headquarters of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade, will be the official retreat house for the movement. Archbishop McNicholas will be the permanent spiritual director and the Rev. Frank A. Thill, Ph. D., will be vice-director.

It is probable that several of the retreats will be preached by the Archbishop himself. Thereafter a number of widely known preachers will direct the exercises of the various retreats.

Programs of exercises will always be arranged to open Friday evenings and to close Sunday evenings. In this way the retreatants will not be obliged to absent themselves from business callings more than one day—Saturday.

Non-Catholic men will be permitted to take part in the retreats if they are recommended by Catholic members of the Retreat Movement.

## Catholic Industrial Conference Program

Washington, Jan. 14.—The program of the fifth annual meeting of the Catholic Conference of Industrial Problems, the time and the place of which will be announced later, has just been outlined here by the Rev. R. A. McGowan, secretary of the conference.

One session of the meeting will be devoted to cooperative relationships in industrial concerns with three speakers developing various points of the subject. Another session will treat of the machine problem with addresses by an employer, a labor unionist, and a student of the social effects on the machine in industry.

Three or four selected persons will speak on a prepared paper on Radicalism at another session. A fourth gathering will follow the symposium plan with the discussion centering around the case of an unskilled working man, with a family, in industry. Four or five brief addresses are to follow the presentation of the case.

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## Maronites Want Church In Chicago

 Chicago, Jan. 11.—The Rt. Rev. Joseph Chebelo, 85-year-old bishop, is in Chicago trying to establish a church for his people, the Maronites. There are only about 350 Maronites in the city. On his arrival here Bishop Chebelo was such distressed to find his people had no church. He plans to go before Cardinal Mundelein with an appeal in their behalf.

The aged prelate says Mass every morning at the small altar in front of the home of Antony Kattany, 1130 S. Michigan Avenue, his host. More than one hundred of his followers, all Syrians, attend.

"My people are sheep without a shepherd," he told friends today. Through his efforts churches have been erected for the Maronites in Detroit, St. Paul and other American cities. He speaks only French and his native language, Syrian.

Bishop Chebelo blames divorce for most of the crime evil and he has no time for the flapper.

"He would drive out any girl who wears a sleeveless dress or a short skirt in his presence," Mr. Kattany said today.

"Criminals," he said, "are mostly children of men and women who have led unhappy lives from divorce. Women today marry at the first opportunity and often are sorry. Then they separate and the children are shifted from one parent to another and never are corrected."

## N. C. W. C. Bureau Gets Gift From Malta

Washington, Jan. 14.—For the third successive year, the Maltese Government, at the direction of the Prime Minister, has sent a contribution to the Christmas fund of the N. C. W. C. Bureau of Immigration in recognition of the service rendered by the Bureau to immigrants arriving in this country from Malta. Three years ago the check was for eight pounds. Last year and this year it was for 20 pounds.

The Maltese Superintendent of Emigration has written to Bruce M. Mohler, Director of the Bureau, as follows: "As a very small acknowledgment, the Prime Minister has authorized me to subscribe to your Christmas Fund the sum of 20 pounds which, however small, is, in some way, a tangible proof of our gratitude for what you are constantly doing for us."
