CATHOLIC PROPERTY IS GIVEN BY CALLES TO FREE-THINKERS

Mexico City, Jan. 17.—By decree of President Calles, the annexes of a Catholic church in Mexico City have just been ordered turned over to a federation of Free-Thinkers for use as offices and shops. This, perhaps the most insolent seizure and conversion of Catholic church property by Calles to date, is set forth in the Diario Oficial, or official journal of the Government. It is being pointed out as new proof conclusive that Calles is the foe of all religion, not merely the Catholic Church.

Charge Which Caused Statement

The charge which the Bishops' answer refuted was contained in the following opening paragraph of a Government statement: "By order of the President of the Republic, there is herewith made known to the press a resume of the activities of the clericals in various States of the country during the first days of the present year. The clerical elements, directed from this capital city by the episcopate, knowing that during these first days (of the year) our international relations would be critical or might even be altered in a manner unfavorable to us, and not unwilling to take advantage of this opportunity to demonstrate that they continue to be traitors to the country as they have always been, received instructions to rebel against the Government in the largest number of men possible under the motto of 'Long Live Christ the King.'"

Card. Hayes Urges Charity Worker Aim At Spirit Of Christ

New York, Jan. 20.—Cardinal Hayes, addressing the workers of the Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of New York yesterday morning at its headquarters at 477 Madison Avenue, made an appeal for the charity worker to aim at the spirit of Christ. "The charity worker," said the Cardinal, "should be efficient, should be for the benefit of the poor, but his aim should be the spirit of Christ. The aim should be the spirit of Christ."

Day of Spiritual Recollection for the Charity Workers

"When Catholic Charities was organized the only purpose was to spread the spirit of Christ, and all in the organization from chief executive to humblest aid, in loyalty to the organization, must fill their minds and hearts and souls, their labors and their aspirations with this spirit. Kindness must always be their aim; kindness in difficult circumstances, kindness in adverse circumstances, kindness in the face of ingratitude, even of an insult, so that those who are ministered to may feel that the presence of Christ himself has been with them."
