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Weekly Calendar Of Feast Days

Sunday, April 3.—St. Richard of Chichester refused wealth and a brilliant marriage to study for the priesthood at Oxford. Later he became Chancellor of the University of Oxford and Chancellor of the Diocese of Canterbury. Elected Bishop of Chichester in spite of the king's opposition, the Saint governed his see with great wisdom and brought about reforms. He died in 1253 while preaching a Crusade against the Saracens.

Monday, April 4.—St. Isidore, Archbishop, was born of a ducal family at Carthage in Spain. He succeeded his brother Leander as Archbishop of Seville and successfully combated the Arian heresy. He died at Seville on April 4, 636, and within 16 years of his death was declared a Doctor of the Catholic Church.

Tuesday, April 5.—St. Vincent Ferrer, "The Angel of Judgment," died from grief caused by a schism that was afflicting the Church, was miraculously restored and instructed to go forth and convert sinners. For 21 years he preached throughout Europe, converting thousands. He died at Vannes in Brittany in 1419.

Wednesday, April 6.—St. Celestine, Pope, was a native of Rome and was chosen Pope in 422 by the wonderful consent of the entire city. He excommunicated and deposed Nestorius and fought the Pelagian heresy. Many authors of the life of St. Patrick say that Eric's patron saint received his commission to preach to the Irish from St. Celestine in 431. He died in 432.

Thursday, April 7.—St. Hegesippus, a primitive Father, was by birth a Jew. In the year 133 he wrote the history of the Church in five volumes, from the "Passion of Christ" down to his own time. The loss of this book is deeply regretted.

Friday, April 8.—St. Perpetua, Bishop, was the eighth Bishop of Tours from St. Gatian, and as such labored zealously with sermons, many sermons and wholesome regulations to lead souls to virtue. He had a great veneration for the saints. **Saturday, April 9.—St. Mary of Egypt**, after 17 years of shame spent in Alexandria, accompanied a pilgrim to Jerusalem. In the city in front of the church and during the feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, her misery and pollution burst upon her and she appealed to the blessed Virgin, whose pictures faced her from the porch, vowing to do penance if allowed to enter the church and stand like Magdalen beside the cross. She entered, and later spent almost a half century in penance in the wilderness. She died in 421.

Family Endowment In Australia Made Government's Plan

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Sydney, Australia, March 1.—The Family Endowment Bill, introduced by the Minister for Mines and Labor and Industry, in the Legislative Assembly provides for the endowment of mothers in respect of their children under the age of 14 years at the rate of five shillings a week for each child. In cases where the combined family income of the mother, her husband, and children does not exceed 34 pounds per annum. The Bill further provides for the establishment of a family endowment fund, and for the contribution thereto by employers at a rate to be fixed by Parliament, and the necessary machinery clauses similar to those of the Widows' Pensions Act of 1925, to enable claims to be investigated and payments made. Under the bill, child means a son, daughter, stepson or step-daughter, and a child legally adopted. It does not mean an illegitimate child, nor a child who is an inmate of a charitable institution, nor a child in respect of whom a pension is payable under the Widows' Pensions Act or the Miners' Accident Relief Act or an allowance is made under the Commonwealth Public Service Act, the child of an alien, the child of an Asiatic father, and the child of a father who is an aboriginal native of Africa, the islands of the Pacific, or New Zealand. Where, in the opinion of the Registrar, the circumstances of any case render it desirable to do so, he may authorize the payment of an endowment in respect of an illegitimate child.

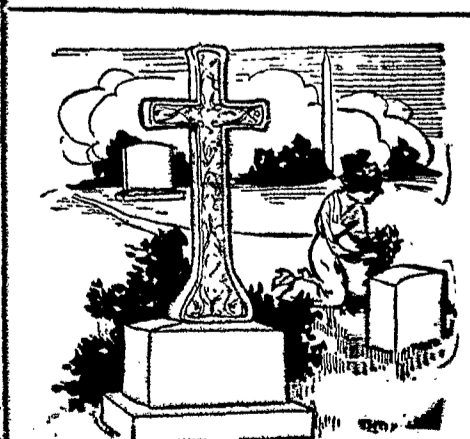

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Austria's Catholic Social Action Union
Widely Supported
By Dr. Frederic Funder,

Vienna, March 18.—The National Union of the Catholics of Austria, designed to carry out in future under the leadership of the bishops the "Catholic Action" recommended by the Pope, held its general meeting here a few days ago and heard reports of extraordinary activity in various fields. The organization has for its tasks the cultivation of religious life, Christian education, and the training for social life, and has in the archdiocese of Vienna, alone 469 establishments to which are attached 44,560 families. Working in connection with the National Union are the various Catholic associations of men and women, as well as the Catholic organizations for the youth, all of which number in the archdiocese of Vienna about 50,000 organized members. In the course of the year the National Union sent speakers to 658 meetings in the Vienna diocese alone and 1,113 meetings were held by it. The recent beneficial activity, however, was displayed by the National Union in the educational courses in which a methodical training is given in the various spheres of science and of brainwork. Four courses were held on agrarian policy, two courses for Catholic deputies, courses for factory councillors (who are the elected representatives of the workmen in industrial undertakings), other courses again were held to train the participants acquainted with Christian art, literature, and foreign languages. The National Union also keeps a newspaper register for the spheres of public life which at present contains in 3,000 articles around a number of one million and a half newspaper cuttings. The organization rests on a developed system of well-organized confidence, 3170 members, this choice troop in various ways make the regular connection between the
