Spring Tonics Are Found in Food

Spring days are approaching. This is the time when Tommy thinks of tops and marbles and climbs the attic stairs to get out last year's baseball bat and suit, while his mother's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of spring bitters, phosphates, iron and wine tonics or to divers household remedies which are supposed to put her young hopeful into fit condition after the long winter months.

Well, one way or the other, through pills, tonics, golf sticks or the call of the great outdoors, we are in for a little repair work about the time the burly-gurdy man appears in the city streets and the florists' windows and the corner flower-vendors display narcissuses and jonquills. It may be a good plan for Mother, about this time to stage her annual spring housecleaning, or for city health departments to call for a spring "Clean-Up Week."

brewing of worthwhile concoctions and spring bitters. In the light of our newer knowledge of nutrition and of the body's need for food, minerals take their place alongside the longer established proteins, starches, sugars and fats as essential elements of the diet.

Where To Get Phosphates. By far the best source of other minerals is vegetables, although they are good for other things also. They contain the very phosphates and iron which the doctor orders in his prescription and which the "patent" spring tonic claims to provide.

And don't forget his fruit! Children like it. Some fruit every day in winter as well as when it is more plentiful is a good investment for the child's health. It supplies needed minerals and vitamins. Milk, vegetables, fruit there you have it—the secret of how not to have spring fever. Often during the long winter months the body has been deprived of these foods or has received them infrequently.
