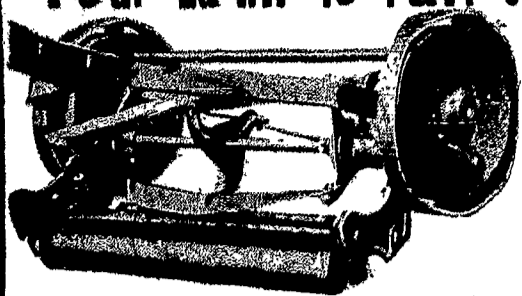

Cullion Leper Colony Cures Woodstock, Md., April 15.—Of the 760 patients cared for in the dormitories conducted by the two Jesuit chaplains at the Cullion Leper Colony during 1926, 49, or 6.45 per cent, were declared negatives (or cured) according to a report received here from the Rev. Mariano Juan, S. J., superior of the chaplaincy. Of the 4,373 lepers in the rest of the colony only 113, or 2.53 per cent, were declared negatives during the year. If the Jesuits could build more dormitories they could effect more cures, it is reported.

Maryland Catholic Teacher, Dismissed, Demands Rehearing (By N. C. W. C. News Service) Baltimore, Md., April 15.—Miss Theresa Nicht, who, it is contended, was deposed as principle of the elemental school at New Windsor, Md., because she was a Catholic, will appeal to the State Board of Education from the decision of the Carroll County School Board, which upheld the county superintendent of schools. Four of the six members of the Carroll county board signed the decision saying the county superintendent had acted properly in transferring Miss Nicht. The board holds that she is still a teacher in the schools though absent from duty. When notified of the transfer last February, Miss Nicht asserted that the action was a dismissal and not a transfer. Her friends alleged that she had been transferred because she was a Catholic and opposed by members of the Ku Klux Klan who wanted her removed. On advice of her attorney, Miss Nicht declined to accept appointment to any Carroll County school except that at New Windsor.

At the conclusion of these festivities in the City of David an imposing procession moved from St. Catherine church through the Basilica of the Nativity and the principal streets of the town. The permission to hold such an unusual ceremony within the walls of the Nativity Sanctuary was granted by the Orthodox authorities and is considered a special sign of the sympathy felt here for the Franciscan Fathers.

Russia Held Cause Of China's Turmoil Gilroy, Calif., April 11.—Father James Lewis of Hollister, who spent many years as a missionary in China and who returned from that country recently in an address to the Rotary Club here a few days ago described conditions in the Oriental republic. "Russia is at the bottom of the present unrest in China and I can assure you the dislike of the Chinese race for the Englishman and other outside races is very much exaggerated", Father Lewis said. "If Russia had not started the present disorder, conditions in China would not be so bad as they are right now."

Missioners Still In China Warned

Washington, April 15.—Further warnings to Americans to leave dangerous areas of China have been sent out by American consular officers on the ground, the State Department has announced. Minister MacMurray has sent to "all American missions, individuals and companies" in Northern Honan province south of the Yellow river a message saying that "in view of the present civil warfare, the Legation earnestly advises all American citizens to withdraw from all districts of Honan south of the Yellow River." He had previously sent like advice to Americans in Anhwei and Kiangsi.

The American Consul at Canton has reported that the American Baptist mission in the city of Kwelin has been looted, but that all Americans had previously left the city. A message relayed to the State Department from Nanking, where there recently was serious trouble, says depositions show that "the outrages committed by Nationalist soldiers at Nanking were even more riotous than was at first realized." The message also gives information to the following effect, according to the Department: "There were two known cases of attempted but unsuccessful criminal assaults upon American women. There were also several other cases only slightly less serious in character. The Nanking message states that the campaign of terrorism in insult to foreigners is not only officially countenanced and directed, but even prearranged. The incident at Nanking could hardly have been more outrageous."

The Department adds: "Suggestions are made by this message of the immediate withdrawal of all Americans in Nationalist territory."

Holy Father Given Chicago Congress Pictures In Album Rome, April 11.—His Holiness Pope Pius XI has received as a gift a historic album of pictures of the twenty-eighth International Eucharistic Congress made by the stationery Chicago Herald and Examiner during the Congress, last June. The Holy Father thanked the donors of the present through their representative.

Plans For Biggest Hospital In U. S.

News Service) Pittsburgh, Pa., April 14.—St. Francis Hospital of this city will be the largest general non-Government operated hospital in the United States when the building plans just announced for it have been executed. Friends of the institution are organizing themselves into groups preparatory to appealing for \$1,600,000 necessary to carry out the plans. The hospital, under the present plans, will be increased from 600 to 850 beds, and will become one of the most modern institutions of hospitalization in the country. The hospital has been rendering service in Pittsburgh since October 30, 1865, and never before has appealed to the public for funds. It possesses no endowment but gives a large amount of free service. Gets Bishop Muldoon's Picture Notre Dame, Ind., April 15.—The famous Lemoine Art Gallery of the University of Notre Dame is to receive a painting of the Rt. Rev. P. J. Muldoon, Bishop of Rockford, painted by a Sister of St. Patrick's Academy, Chicago. The Rev. James F. Callaghan of St. Malachy's parish, Chicago, is the donor of the painting.

Forty-Six Schools Will Have Teams In Relay Carnival

News Service) Milwaukee, Wis., April 15.—Teams representing 46 schools already have been entered in the fifth annual Marquette University National High School Relay Carnival to be held in Marquette Stadium, May 7. This number easily exceeds the entries of last year and it is expected that the carnival will prove to be one of the greatest prep school athletic events ever staged in the Middle West. A dozen schools enrolled their teams last week, while 15 schools from Chicago and its immediate vicinity are scheduled to compete. As a special feature of the carnival, Melvin, Shimek, Marquette University's brilliant distance runner, will give an exhibition. Efforts are being made to have Phil Ost, the Haskell Indian runner, oppose him.

Apostolic Delegate To Japan, Mikado's Guest At Luncheon

Tokyo, April 1.—His Excellency Archbishop Marius Giardini, Apostolic Delegate to Japan, was the guest of honor at a luncheon given by His Majesty the Emperor in the Akasaka Detached Palace here recently. The Pope's representative wore the First Order of Merit, Grand Cordons of Paulownia, a decoration which had been awarded to him by the Emperor some time ago. Just before the luncheon, Archbishop Giardini was received in audience by the Emperor, who shook hands with him. Prince Chichibu and Prince Asaka were among the imperial personages who attended the luncheon. Other guests were Mr. Kitokuro Ikki, Minister of the Imperial Household Department; Baron Shidehara, Foreign Minister; the grand chamberlain, the grand master of ceremonies and the chief aide-de-camp to the Emperor. It will be remembered that the Apostolic Delegate to Japan visited the United States in the summer of 1925.

Pilgrims To Lisieux To Depart June 29

Bourbonnais, Ill., April 14.—The Rev. Matthew T. O'Neill, O. C. C., director of the National Shrine of the "Little Flower", Chicago, has announced that the second annual pilgrimage of the "Little Flower" to Lisieux, France, (home of St. Therese), leaving Chicago on June 29, will be divided into three sections, all traveling at the same time, under the one direction. The innovation of the three sections was decided upon in order to accommodate both the financial and time limitations of the many who are desirous of making the tour. The first section will require 31 days. The other sections will make tours of 46 and 61 days, respectively. The first section will arrive in New York on the homeward voyage on July 31. The other tours will be completed on August 15 and August 30, the first returning by way of Montreal and the second by way of New York.

All Catholic Rites In Holy Land Honor St. Francis Assisi

News Service) Jerusalem, March 29.—The seventh centenary of St. Francis of Assisi is being observed all over Palestine and great congregations are being attracted everywhere by the impressive liturgical ceremonies. All Catholic rites of the Holy Land—Latin, Greek, Armenian, Syrian and Abyssinian) are participating in turn in the public tribute to the founder of the Franciscan Order, which for seven centuries has provided many sacrifices and martyrs in the Holy Places. A solemn celebration has just been held at Nazareth where among the principal guests were the Most Rev. Mgr. Hajjar, the Greek-Catholic Archbishop of Galilee, and the Rt. Rev. Aurelio Marotta, Father Custos of the Franciscan Custody of the Holy Places. In April there will be a series of conferences in Jerusalem to the same end. The conferences will be held in different languages. The one to be conducted in English will be held by the Rev. Dr. Romain Butin, professor of oriental languages and director of the museum at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D. C., who for this year is director of the American School of Oriental Research in the Holy City. Particularly impressive were the observances just held at Bethlehem. These lasted two weeks and every day during the morning and evening services, Father Marmarji, O. P., a professor at the Dominican Bible school in Jerusalem, and Father Faruqi of the Latin Patriarchate, parish priest at Tayebeh, preached the sermons. Tayebeh is the ancient Ophra, Aphra or Ephrem to which Jesus retired and where He sojournd with His disciples when the Sanhedrin had decreed His death.
