## Eucharistic Congress Movies to be Shown by Catholic Women's Club

With the approval of the Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Eliekey, D. D., bishop of the Catholic diocese of Rochester, the Catholic Women's Club have closed negotiations for the showing in Rochester of the official eight-reel motion picture of the 28th International Eucharistic Congress and will present the pictures in Convention Hall, the second week in May.

Committees have been appointed by the officers of the Catholic Women's club to work in every parish of the city acquainting the people with the showing of this picture. The film is the authentic record of the Congress and was presented to His Eminence, George Cardinal Mundelein, Archbishop of Chicago, by William Fox, president of the Fox Film Corporation which company made the film.

In the preparation of the film twenty expert cameramen were employed. These were stationed at the Fox News and Fox Varieties in both Europe and the United States. Few other cities of the United States have witnessed the picture but in those cities, critics have written feelingly of the impressiveness of the film.

Arrangements have also been made by the Catholic Women's club to have special matinees for the children of the Catholic orphan asylums. Although the picture carries the story of the Catholic event, the showing of the film is to be open to the public. Tickets will be fifty cents for adults and twenty-five cents for children.

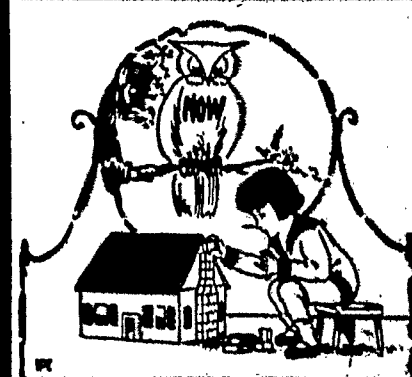
