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40,000 Louisiana Catholics Listed As Flood Victims

Bishop Leveque's Wives - Their Homes And Suffering - Their Churches Ruined, they Hear Masses in Ball Parks and Warehouses - St. Louis Sends Relief

Lafayette, La., June 3.—With the crest of the flood slowly engulfing Morgan City, the last town of consequence in its path to the sea, and the water slowly receding along the 115-mile front in the Diocese of Lafayette, some estimate can now be made of the extent of the territory affected and the damage done.
Eight church parishes—Lebeau, Port Barre, Lezardville, Arnaudville, Cecilia, Breaux Bridge, St. Martinville and Loreauxville—with a total Catholic population of over 22,000 were entirely submerged.
Five others—New Iberia, with two churches, one of which is for the colored people, Jeanerette, Charenton, Baldwin and Patterson—had so much water in their streets that at least half their population sought refuge in other towns or camps, while their rural population was forced to look for shelter in the refugee camps. The rural population in seven other parishes were also driven from their homes.

40,000 Catholics Sustain Losses
Of the 60 parishes, 21 situated in the richest agricultural and most Catholic section were affected by the devastating flood. Of the 45,000 or more who were driven from their homes, no fewer than 40,000 are Catholics. The great majority of these are the descendants of the brave and pious Acadians, who, fleeing from persecution, had built their humble homes and found peace and plenty in the fertile soil in the picturesque country along the oak fringed banks of Bayou Teche.
Longfellow could write long ago that "those who live there call it the Eden of Louisiana," but sadly changed with the ruined Acadian refugees find it when they go back a month or two hence to see their homes swept away, wrecked or damaged; their farms devastated; their cattle drowned or scattered over the plains of Louisiana or Texas, and their whole beautiful country defaced and scarred by the swiftness of the torrent that swept so swiftly through it.

ident that our great government and the wonderful Red Cross will soon give them the necessary start.
Until the churches, chapels and schools in the path of the flood are free from the water, no estimate can be made of the extent of the damage.
At the rehabilitation conference here last week, Mr. Hoover said that a peculiarly discouraging situation faced this section in that the waters would recede too late to permit the replanting of staple crops, like cotton, corn and cane.
Our prostrate people will be able to do little towards their rehabilitation and their maintenance for the next two years. Hence, I have joined His Grace, Archbishop Shaw of New Orleans, and the Bishop of Alexandria in an appeal to the generous dioceses of the country to come to our aid.

Masses in Ball Park
The priests have followed their people and with their local clergy are ministering to their spiritual needs in the camps established at Lafayette, Opelousas, Burke, Eunice and Washington. Masses are said daily and the rosary devoutly, so dear to our people, are held in the evening.
In Lafayette and Crowley, the Masses on Sunday are said in the ball park grandstand near the camp. In Opelousas, Crowley and Eunice, immense rice warehouses are being used. No fewer than 12,000 Catholic negroes are among the refugees in Lafayette, Burke, Opelousas and Crowley and are being faithfully served by the Holy Ghost and Josephite Fathers.

Mexican Catholics Banished to Island

Mexico City, May 31.—One hundred and thirty prisoners have just been shipped to the Mexican west coast in freight cars to be transferred to Mexico's dread island prison, "Tres Marias."
Half of the 130 are prominent Catholics charged by the Government with sedition. Many of them are leading citizens in their home localities. Among them is Leon Avalos president of the League for the Defense of Religious Freedom in Guadalajara.

Clergy's Attitude In Irish Campaign

Dublin, May 31. The General Election is expected to take place during the second week of June. All parties are engaged in feverish electioneering.
The Government Party, known as "Cumann nan Gaedheal," have taken all possible steps to obtain clerical support. Three months ago, during a preliminary election tour of the West, Messrs. Blythe and Hogan, Free State Ministers of Finance and of Agriculture, succeeded in getting the bishops of the west of Ireland, with a few exceptions, to preside at the footstaps of the Free State Ministers. Mr. de Valera made a western tour, during which one member of the hierarchy, the Bishop of Clonfert, gave him warm support.
The latest figures show that during the last week-end the Very Rev. Dean Macken of Clonmorris, the Very Rev. Archbishop Fallon of Cashel, the Very Rev. Father James Burke, P. P. of Knocknashel, Kerry, and the Rev. Fathers Bannon, Nolan, and O'Riordan, either presided at or spoke at meetings addressed by Government Ministers. A careful study of the press does not reveal any meetings at which the Catholic clergy appeared in support of the anti-Government candidates during the last few days.

Spain's Princesses Show Great Piety

Madrid, May 30.—The daughters of the Spanish sovereigns were recently received into the congregation of the Children of Mary. They have shown great piety, especially in the last few weeks in the course of the spiritual exercises, given for the intention of the women of the aristocracy at the convent of the Religious Slaves of the Sacred Heart. The infantas went to the convent every day early in the morning and remained until evening without returning to the palace, in order to take part in all the exercises of these pious days.
Their mother, Queen Victoria, gives them a good example in this respect. She belongs to the Congregation of Christian Mothers and attends its meetings regularly and goes to its monthly Communion Mass held in the chapel of the Congregation.

English Bishop Acts as Fireman

St. Boniface Society Celebrate Jubilee

Dansville, June 7.—The observance of the Diamond Jubilee of St. Boniface Society, the oldest organization affiliated with St. Mary's church, was brought to a close by a banquet at the Foster Hotel Monday evening, June 6th, at which Rt. Rev. Rochester diocese was guest of honor. Seated at the Clergy table with the Rt. Rev. Bishop were Rev. F. J. Naughton of Hornell, N. Y., Dean of this district; Rev. Leo G. Hofscheider, Pastor of St. Mary's church, Dansville; Rev. Ferdinand Schied, pastor of Sacred Heart Church, Perkinsville; Rev. George Schneider, C. S. S. R. of St. Joseph's Church, Rochester; Rev. Thomas Toole of St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester; Rev. Adolph Edelman, assistant pastor of St. Mary's church, Dansville; Rev. Robert Keizer, assistant pastor St. Anne's church, Hornell; Rev. Patrick Kelley, acting pastor of St. Patrick's church, Dansville; Mr. Jacob M. Fries, president of St. Boniface Society was toastmaster. America was sung by the assemblage en masse and the invocation by the Rt. Rev. Bishop followed. Rev. Leo G. Hofscheider responded to the toast—"Our Organizer (Rev. Aloys A. Somogyi, D. D.)," and in his inimitable eloquent way the Rev. Past presented history which was admirable in content and arrangement, and some of the less familiar facts he presented were of striking interest. Said the speaker: "The misfortune in the death of a young married parishoner in the first year of the pastorate of Father Somogyi led to the organization of St. Boniface Society. The sad plight of the young widow with her small dependable family touched the sympathetic chord of the tender-hearted priest and induced him to take action. He summoned the men of the parish to a meeting which resulted in the organization of St. Boniface Society March 30, 1852. That St. Boniface Society has ever been true and loyal to its object and purpose, and a credit to its noble and saintly founder is certified by its enviable history of the past 75 years, and which justifies this solemn celebration of this Diamond Jubilee."
The toast—"Our Organization" was aptly responded to by Mr. Simon Albert, former president of St. Boniface Society. The speaker graphically sketched the fruitful workings of the benevolent Bonifacians. Anecdotes of humor interspersed the valuable treatise of an important subject.
The glad and prolonged acclaim which greeted Father Hofscheider when he arose to speak was repeated when the Rt. Rev. Bishop Hickey's toast was announced. Every person in look and manner manifested love, reverence and fidelity to Bishop and pastor and it possible further cemented by bonds of love and allegiance the existing revered relations of these two spiritual heads and St. Mary's parishoners. The Bishop spoke with fervor and power, and with a broadness of information that was captivating, of the majestic breadth of the religious work accomplished by the pioneer Catholics of St. Mary's church and the succeeding generations down to and including the present. In conclusion the Bishop expressed his hearty sympathy with and congratulations to St. Boniface society on this their Diamond Jubilee and raised his hand in benediction as a finale of a very happy observance.

St. Boniface Society prefaced the banquet celebration of its 75th anniversary with a retreat which began Tuesday evening, May 31st, with Rev. Geoffrey Stone C. S. S. R. of St. Joseph's church, Rochester, as retreat master. It was participated in by all of the parishoners of St. Mary's church. The solemn closing was on Sunday evening, June 3, Rev. George Schneider C. S. S. R. of Rochester delivering the inspiring sermon and conferring the Papal Blessing.
Rev. Alois Somogyi organized St. Boniface Society March 30, 1852. There were 25 charter members, all of whom are dead. The 25th anniversary was observed June 5, 1877 by a banquet at Columbus Hall. At that time there were 67 members. June 1st and 2d, 1902, the Society observed its golden jubilee in conjunction with the seventh annual convention of the Staats Verband. The convention was held here in Dansville as an act of fraternity on the part of the Staats Verband and also to emphasize the celebration of the golden jubilee of St. Boniface society.

Bishop Hickey and his attending clergy visited St. Mary's Church at 4 o'clock and gave confirmation to a class of about ninety-two children and adults who had been prepared by the Rev. Leo Hofscheider and the Rev. Adolph Edelman.

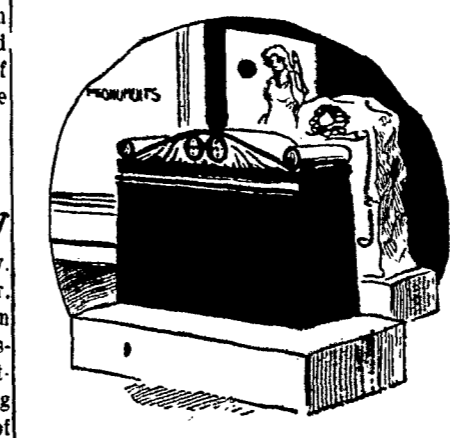
EMMET K. COURNEEN
