Another thing, when we realize that our religion is the great comfort of our lives and that it teaches us to be charitable above all things, how can we then calmly attend our own beautiful churches year in and year out and make no effort to bring the real solace of life to others who would be satisfied with the thickest of little chapels in which to worship God, if they but once knew Him. God wishes all to be saved and hence it is surely up to everyone to do his best for the salvation of immortal souls.

We cannot afford to consider too lightly the great blessing of having been born a Catholic and of having been given every opportunity for carrying out our duties as such. But one of these duties is charity, and what is more charitable than to aid in propagating the Faith.

By fulfilling this duty we will not only be doing what is right, but we will bring real happiness into the lives of others, and, incidentally, into our own lives. We must expect to make some sacrifices in this world, but sacrifices made for God are repaid a hundred-fold, and if we would

give evidence of our real faith, we cannot "to mere worldly tasks attend." Living in this world as we do, we need all the spiritual help we can get, and what will God reward more than strong cooperation in the all important work of the missions.

Finally, we would not have it said that America failed in this need presented to her. We want her to develop more and more a strong missionary spirit, a spirit that will produce as results, triumphs of faith. This she will do if every Catholic individually does his best. Much will then be accomplished of which we can be justly proud.
