Nevada's 3-Month Residence Divorce Law Is Held Valid

Bartlett, presiding in the Washoe County District Court, ruled that the statute is constitutional. Judge Bartlett's decision, definite action in the controversy that has centered around the constitutionality of the enactment, is said to have brought considerable comfort to a great number of persons who have gone into Reno to establish divorce residence, and to others who already have obtained "marital freedom" under this provision.

Holy Father Thanks Americans for Help To Swiss Seminary

Milwaukee, July 13.—Pope Pius XI desires that his personal gratitude and appreciation and his blessing be conveyed to all American Catholics who assisted the Rev. Francis Hoelzler, representative of the Rt. Rev. George Schmitz, Bishop of Chur, Switzerland, during his sojourn in the United States in the interest of the foreign mission seminary of the diocese of Chur. In an audience granted the Swiss priest upon his arrival in Rome, from the United States, His Holiness listened with deep interest to Father Hoelzler's account of the liberality of American Catholics, and expressed a desire that a report be submitted to Cardinal Gasparri, papal secretary of state. A special blessing was sent to the Superior General and all the school Sisters of St. Francis at whose motherhouse in Milwaukee Father Hoelzler had his headquarters while at Chur. Father Hoelzler, who is now in Switzerland, reports that Archbishop Schmitz has arrived at Chur, his birthplace in Canton Graubunden, and will go to Switzerland before the end of the month to be present at the closing of the fall session.

Nativity Congress In France Sept 29
