**Pope Makes German Bishop Roman Count**  
Cologne, July 28.—The Rt. Rev. Carl Augustin Kilian, Bishop of Limburg, has just been notified of his appointment as an assistant at the Papal throne, and of his elevation to the Papal nobility with the title of Count. This distinction is considered very unusual, having been received by few Bishops in this country.

**English Catholic, In Processions 71 Years, Dead At 78**  
London, July 28.—John Corbishley who took part in 71 annual outdoor Catholic processions at Preston died recently at the age of 78.  
Having taken part in the event for seventy years without break, he got up from a sick bed last Wednesday rather than spoil his record. At that time he had been in bed continuously for six months and as soon as the procession was over he returned to bed and remained there till his death.  
Last Whitsuntide the local Orange lodges placed a carriage at his disposal to enable him to complete the route, and he accepted the offer in the conciliatory spirit in which it was made.  
Mr. Corbishley, who took a prominent part in civic affairs, had been a member of the Preston Board of Guardians for twenty-six years.  
The Mayor of Preston attended the funeral, with other town officials of the Guilds which organize the annual procession in which Corbishley had been a familiar figure so long, walked in the funeral cortege.

**German Town Marks Its 16th Centenary With Mystery Play**

Cologne, July 25.—The city of Herten on the Lower Rhine in the Duesseldorf district has begun the celebration of the sixteen hundredth anniversary of the founding of the first Christian church in that city with "The Mystery-Play of St. Victor", which is to be repeated every Sunday and Thursday throughout the summer. More than 400 people are in the cast of the play, which was written by Erich Eckert, a poet famed for the composition and production of similar plays founded in medieval history and tradition.  
The old amphitheater at Herten-Birten was built by the Roman soldiers near Castra Vetera, as Herten was then called, and the place is famous because of the martyrdom of the Thebaic legion soldiers and their leader, St. Victor. Soon after their death the first Christian church was established and Christianity spread throughout the district.  
Herten is further distinguished in Nibelungen, a tale of the Christian era, in which Siegfried, the hero son of the king living in Herten, kills a dragon, bathes in its blood, marries Kriemhilde and later is murdered.  
The poet Eckert has woven all these themes into the play that is commemorating the anniversary. He is directing the production personally. The arena in which it is staged accommodates 12,000 persons. The first performance was outstanding and has been hailed with great praise by all the papers.

Sillmar charges were made by the vicious Fellowship Forum, anti-Catholic publication, immediately after the tragedy. The present folders bear the signature "The Gopher Agency," with a post office box in Chicago.
