Cliff Haven, N. Y., Aug. 10.—Rev. Louis Maltis, O. F. M., Frederick Paulding, Litt. D., and Prof. J. M. O'Gorman, A. M., of Marquette University, were the lecturers at Cliff Haven this week.

Dr. Paulding lectured on "Sense and Nonsense in the Short Story." His course was especially adapted to show teachers, how, in any course of literature, they can, in one class period, present a short story.

Program of Priests' Eucharistic League Convention Issued

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 4.—The program of the Fourth Regional Convention of the Priests' Eucharistic League, here, August 30 and 31, has just been issued.

The headquarters of the convention will be at St. Louis church, at Main and Edward streets. There will be a meeting of the diocesan directors on the evening of August 29.

The first paper to be read at the general session convening at 2 p. m., August 30, will be "The Priest and his Personal Devotion to the Holy Eucharist," by the Very Rev. James W. Donahue, C. S. C., of Notre Dame University.

Solemn Holy Hour for the visiting clergy is set for 8 p. m., August 30, with the Rt. Rev. Joseph Schrembs, Bishop of Cleveland, national protector of the Priests' Eucharistic League.

Solemn Pontifical Mass of Requiem for the deceased members of the league will inaugurate the second day of the convention, August 31.

The sectional meeting in school hall, at 10 a. m., "The Rubrics of the Mass," will be described in a paper by the Rev. Francis J. Connell, C. S. R., Euclid, N. Y., and discussed by the Rt. Rev. Monsignor Joseph McMahon, New York City.

The second paper, by the Rev. Francis X. Sindle, S. J., will be "Frequent Communion and the Means of Promoting It." The discussion will be by the Very Rev. Monsignor Francis M. O'Brien, Chicago, and the Rev. G. C. Picard, Kankakee, Ill.

At the general session in the auditorium the final paper of the convention, "The Liturgical Movement as Related to the Mass and Sacramental Devotions," will be presented by the Rt. Rev. Alwin Deutsch, O. S. B., of Collegeville, Minn.

Archbishop Hughes' Old Home Is Sold

New York, Aug. 3.—The recent purchase by undisclosed interests of a group of properties on Madison Avenue, Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh streets, opposite the home of J. P. Morgan here, marks the passing of a famous Catholic landmark.

The old dwelling at 218 Madison Avenue, now under contract of sale to the syndicate, was the residence of the Most Rev. John Hughes, Archbishop of New York up till the time of his death in 1864.

In an article under the caption "A Famous Catholic Landmark Passes," Thomas F. Meehan, writing in the July 30 number of America, treats the subject in an interesting manner.

Church's Influence Birth-Rate Factor, Frenchman Admits

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Paris, Aug. 1.—M. Georges Rossignol, a State Inspector of Education, who has just retired, published in Victory a declaration which has caused a good deal of comment.

The author, who has been very actively interested in the campaign for the increase of the birth-rate, is not a Catholic and in the past he claimed that Catholicism could do little for repopulation. In his article in Victory, he relates how, confronted with several successive experiences, his judgment was modified.

"Proudhon says somewhere that one must admire those who pronounce these heretic, these sublime words: 'I have made a mistake. Well, we are going to be heroic.' I declare, therefore, that, in holding that the Catholic religion could not help us to give France the taste for the practice of having large families, I made a serious, a very serious mistake and that today, I detest my error.

"Before the thirtieth year, we had not come into contact with these beautiful and numerous families of the Nord, of Brittany, and of Alsace who conform their actions to their external religious practices and who very often have eight or ten or more children. We had not yet meditated on the Canadian and Acadian miracles, and established, as we have now, that the populations of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and the banks of the Saint Lawrence owed to their priests the resurrection of their race, because of their faith, their piety, and as a consequence, their belief in large families."

M. Rossignol concludes by declaring that, in order to make sure that France shall be born again, she must call religious forces to her assistance.

Chinese Trappists Plan New Convent

Maryknoll, Aug. 2.—The Trappist monks of the Monastery of Our Lady of Consolation at Yangkiaping, near Peking, expect to start a new foundation in China next October.

There are now nearly a hundred religious in the Trappist monastery at Yangkiaping. The majority of these contemplatives are natives and the Chinese have proved themselves admirably fitted for this vocation.

The new foundation, the Monastery of Our Lady of Joy, will be at Chengtungfu, considerably to the south-west of Peking in Chihli province.

Catholic Medical Mission Board Has New Headquarters

New York, Aug. 2.—Executive headquarters of the Catholic Medical Mission Board have been moved from their former location at 1819 Broadway into a larger suite of offices at 25 West Broadway, between Park Place and Barclay street.

The Catholic Medical Mission Board is a national organization and has for its general purpose the linking of Catholic America to Catholic medical missions, thereby promoting the apostolate of medical missions.

Notice Of Marriage Increased One Day

Sacramento, Calif., Aug. 4.—An opinion just rendered by Robert W. Harrison, deputy attorney-general, of the new law requiring the filing of notice by persons intending to marry, virtually increases the period between notification and the issuance of a marriage license from three to four days. The law, which went into effect a few days ago, provides that a notice of intention must be filed three days before the issuance of a license. Harrison's ruling, which was made at the request of the district attorney of San Mateo county, holds that the day on which the application is made must be excluded, and the three-day period of notice date from the midnight following.

Fr. W. Whalen Plans Field Mass, Picnic

Maj. J. J. Donovan To Manage K. of C. Club in New York

New York, Aug. 6.—Major John J. Donovan, army officer, hotel manager, caterer, steward and football player is in future to direct the activities of the K. of C. Club-Hotel here. He was until August 1, manager of the Hotel Cardinal, 71st Street and West End avenue.

Maj. John Donovan served as an enlisted man with Light Battery G, 1st U. S. Artillery in the Island of Panay, in the Philippines. After the period of his enlistment Donovan took the army for the hotel field. He was manager of the Hotel Traymore when the United States entered the World War. He was commissioned as captain and became instructor of artillery at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, later being transferred to the quartermaster corps where he was appointed chief inspector of subsistence for the United States Army.

Ex-Service Men's N. Y. Headquarters Opened by K. of C.

New York, Aug. 5.—Headquarters for ex-service men passing through New York to the convention of the American Legion in Paris next month have been established here by the Supreme Council of the Knights of Columbus, in Suite 5F at the Knights of Columbus Club-Hotel, Eighth Avenue and Fifty-first Street. Denis O'Connell who was general secretary in charge of post-war welfare work of the organization in New York City, will direct the activities of the office.

Approximately sixty Knights of Columbus secretaries, all of whom saw service overseas, will attend the convention. Fred V. Milan, Knight of St. Gregory, Special Agent of the K. of C. in Buffalo, will be the first to leave for France. He sails Saturday on the S. S. REPUBLIC. Michael S. Hogan, of Laurelton, N. J., Supervisor of Educational and Welfare work here, and Michael J. O'Donnell, of Astoria, will leave on the following day.

Edward L. Hearn, Knights of Columbus Overseas Commissioner, will be in charge of the work of the organization in France.

Msgr. Chas. Boehm, Cleveland, Resigns

Cleveland, O., Aug. 4.—The resignation of Msgr. Charles Boehm, pioneer Hungarian priest in the United States, as pastor of St. Elizabeth's parish here was announced today. Msgr. Boehm, who celebrated his golden jubilee in the priesthood in July, 1926, relinquished his charge because of increasing feebleness. He stated in a letter to the Rt. Rev. Joseph Schrembs, Bishop of Cleveland, that the bishop has appointed Msgr. Boehm pastor emeritus of St. Elizabeth's.

For a number of years Msgr. Boehm was on leave of absence from Cleveland and served as pastor in St. Elizabeth's parish, Buffalo. He returned here four years ago to resume his former post as pastor of the Cleveland parish.

J. G. Ewing, Lawyer, Dies In Washington

Washington, D. C., Aug. 4.—John Gillespie Ewing, well known lawyer and leader of the Knights of Columbus, died at his home here yesterday from heart disease which followed an attack of pneumonia last spring. He was in his sixty-ninth year.

Mr. Ewing was born in Lancaster, Ohio, a son of Judge Philomen B. Ewing, and was educated at Notre Dame University, where he taught law and modern history for twenty years. He was admitted to the bar in Ohio and practiced in New York for some time before coming here, seven years ago, to take a post in the Department of Justice.

He organized the Columbian Fire Insurance Company in Detroit between 1911 and 1917 and served as its president. His services with the Knights of Columbus involved several years as national director, and in revising the ritual of the order. His wife, who was Miss Ethel Kelly, and two daughters survive.

Father of Priest And Sister Dead

San Francisco, Aug. 5.—Michael McCoy, father of the Rev. Cornelius J. McCoy, S. J., president of the University of Santa Clara, is dead at the age of 88. The funeral took place from Sacred Heart Church, Wednesday, following a solemn high mass.
