John D. Rockefeller At Flag Dedication At Catholic Church

Pocantio Hills, N. Y., Sept. 17.—John D. Rockefeller took part in the exercises attending the dedication of an American flag, which was raised on the staff on the lawn in front of the Church of the Magdalene here a few days ago. The flag was a gift of Judge Henry Logan to the church and its pastor, the Rev. Aloysius C. Dineen, a regular army chaplain during the World War.

Lieut. Gen. Robert Lee Bullard, who commanded the Second American Army in France, delivered the principal address. Others to speak were: Supreme Court Justice Humphrey J. Lynch of White Plains, Judge Logan, Father Dineen, the Rev. Ambrose J. Murphy, assistant pastor of the church, and Mr. Rockefeller.

Mr. Rockefeller spoke in response to the persistent calls of the residents of the community. He said he was not much of a speaker, but that he was glad to be present at the exercises and to pay tribute to Father Dineen for the exceedingly good work that was being done in his parish.

"I hope to be able to help Father Dineen and his church," Mr. Rockefeller said in conclusion.

Father Dineen was in the army for more than six years, and is now Divisional Chaplain of the Twenty-Seventh Division, and a member of the staff of Maj. Gen. William N. Haskell, commanding the New York National Guard.

Mayor of Savannah Speaker At Dinner To Bishop Walsh

Savannah, Sept. 14.—Four Bishops and the Mayor of Savannah were among the speakers who paid tribute to the Rt. Rev. Emmet M. Walsh, newly consecrated Bishop of Charleston, at a dinner in the De Soto Hotel.

The Rt. Rev. Michael Joseph Keyes, Bishop of Savannah, who received an ovation upon his introduction by the Very Rev. Timothy Foley, V. G., the toastmaster, told in simple language of the friendship that grew up during the five years Bishop Walsh was a member of the Savannah clergy. Although sorry to have to make the sacrifice, Bishop Keyes said that he did so willingly because he knew Charleston and Savannah would be more closely united through the influence of Bishop Walsh.

Speaking on behalf of Savannah, Mayor Thomas M. Haynes assured Bishop Walsh that he carried with him the best wishes of the people of the city of his adoption.

The Rt. Rev. Patrick Barry, Bishop of St. Augustine, and the Rt. Rev. William J. Haley, Bishop of Raleigh, were the next speakers. The former told the new prelate that the burdens and responsibilities of his office would be lightened by the people of Charleston, while the latter told Bishop Walsh that he was glad to hand down to him the title of youngest Bishop, as he had held the title long enough.

The Rt. Rev. Andrew Brennan, Bishop of Richmond, spoke of the responsibilities of the Bishop's office as illustrated by the impressive consecration service. He was impressed, he declared, with the opportunities offered the Church in the South.

Memories of Bishop Walsh's days as a student at St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, N. Y., were recalled in an address by the Rev. Leo Smith who spoke on behalf of the Seminary's alumni. The Rev. Bernard Fleming of the Diocese of Charleston assured the new prelate of the earnest cooperation of the clergy of his See. The Rev. Harry Clark of Savannah spoke of Bishop Walsh's coming to the Georgia See, his development and his return to Charleston as Bishop.

Bishop Walsh in answer to these addresses expressed the hope that he would be worthy of the things that had been said about him by the other speakers. He spoke of his understanding friendship of Bishop Keyes and said that with confidence due to faith he goes to Charleston looking forward to new friendships with his new diocese, but assuring that he has to leave those he has in Savannah.

Mrs. Lillian Lennox, Wife of Professor At Catholic U. Dies

Washington, September 17.—The Rev. Thomas J. Shanahan, Rector of the Catholic University of America, celebrated a solemn requiem Mass in St. Matthew's Church here Wednesday morning for Mrs. Lillian Pakenham Lennox, wife of Dr. F. J. Lennox, professor of English language and literature at the Catholic University, who died here Friday after a long illness. Mrs. Lennox will be buried in Glasnevin Cemetery, Dublin, Ireland.

Mrs. Lennox, a native of Dublin, was a member of the family of the Earls of Langford of Pakenham Hall, County Westmeath, Ireland. Besides her husband she is survived by a brother, James Pakenham of Chicago, and a sister, Mrs. Emily Keedy, of London.

Mrs. Lennox took an active interest in Catholic charitable and educational institutions until poor health prevented her continuing.

Home Of Physician, Non-Catholic, Given To Charity Sisters

Canton, O., Sept. 12.—Dr. H. M. Schuffel, a non-Catholic, has given his large Colonial type residence here to the Sisters of Charity to be used as a hospital for crippled children. It is announced. Dr. Schuffel is chief of the surgical staff of Mercy hospital of which the Sisters of Charity have charge, and the gift of his home to them, he said, was inspired by his admiration of the humanitarian work they are doing.

Associates of Dr. Schuffel at Mercy hospital have contributed \$6,000 to equip an operating room.

The house is in an ideal location for welfare work. It is surrounded by several acres of lawn and a number of trees. The property is considered very valuable.

Catholic Slovak Students Elect

Dunmore, Pa., Sept. 12.—Two hundred and twenty delegates and sixty priests attended the annual convention of the Catholic Slovak Students Fraternity here recently. The convention represented a membership of 25,000 persons. Next year's convention will be held in New York City. Much of the time of the three days' session was taken up with revision of the by-laws of the organization.

Bishop of Lourdes Dies At Age of 84

Paris, Sept. 12.—France is deeply mourning the death of Mgr. Francois-Xavier Schoepfer, Bishop of Lourdes and Tarbes, who died a few days ago, after having officiated at most of the ceremonies of the fifty-fifth national French pilgrimage. The venerable prelate, 84 years of age at the time of his death, had presided over his diocese for 28 years and had done more than probably any other single individual toward the development of the famous pilgrimage to Lourdes.

He was born at Wettolsheim in the diocese of Strasbourg in 1843 and studied at Saint-Sulpice, in Paris. Immediately after his ordination as a priest, in 1866, he became secretary to Msgr. Darboy, then Bishop of Paris. His superior was killed during the uprisings under the Commune in 1871, and he himself was made prisoner by the revolutionists. After he was freed he became successively pastor of several Parisian parishes, among them Notre Dame des Victoires, in 1872, and the historic Notre Dame des Champs, in 1887. In 1889 he was consecrated as Bishop of Lourdes and Tarbes by the Papal Nuncio, Msgr. Lorenzelli, Slattery, C. M., superior of St. Vincent's Seminary, was deacon, and the Rev. F. L. Madeo, C. M., sub-deacon. The Rev. Robert Grogan, C. M., was Michael J. Crane, Auxiliary Bishop of master of ceremonies. The Rt. Rev. Philadelphia, also attended.

New Shrine To Mary In Phila. Blessed

Philadelphia, Pa., September 12.—Cardinal Dougherty officiated at the blessing of a new shrine to the Mother of God in the immaculate Conception chapel of St. Vincent's Seminary. His Eminence also presided at the solemn High Mass (coram Cardinali) which followed the dedication.

The new shrine was built by members of the Central Association of the Miraculous Medal, of which the Rev. Joseph A. Shelly, C. M., is director. The shrine is constructed of marble varying from soft rose tones to alabaster and deep green. Inlaid mosaics of crimson and gold form a striking color motif.
