St. Xavier College Field House Opens

Cincinnati, O., Jan. 10.—The St. Xavier field house costing \$250,000 and having a permanent seating capacity of 4,500 and a maximum of 12,000, seats, was formally opened last week. The formal dedication will take place during the basketball season.

The big gymnasium is built on a ravine adjoining the present west stadium at Osceola Field. When the new \$300,000 stadium is completed St. Xavier will have an athletic plant commensurate with the needs of the college as manifested during the recent rapid growth of the school.

Many original ideas have been embodied in the field house construction by Joe Meyer, father and director of the college, and an architect by profession. A removable floor of three layers, the lower two of pine and the top one of fir, measures 84 by 120 feet. This will be used for basketball.

New French Bishop Received Highest Honor As Soldier

Paris, Jan. 9.—The Sovereign Pontiff has just called to the Episcopal See of Troyes, Father Feltin, who in the World War received the military medal, the highest distinction which can be accorded a soldier.

Magr. Feltin will be probably the only bishop who has ever worn on his cassock the medal with the yellow ribbon bordered with green.

The body was accompanied from Inspector Davis' home to the church by a guard of honor of fifty uniformed policemen. Police chief Donald Marshall and Captain of Inspectors Bodie A. Williams led the funeral procession. Interment was in St. Mary's cemetery.
