**Hoover Marriage Facts As Known In California**

San Francisco, Calif., Feb. 10.—The spotlight recently turned upon the fact that Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce, a Quaker, and Mrs. Hoover, an Episcopalian, were married by a Catholic priest, has revealed the following historical background of the incident:

Shortly after he went to Monterey in 1893, Father Raymond M. Mestres met the Henry Family, who were non-Catholics, through their association with the most prominent Spanish families of his congregation.

When, in 1894, the public school of the town was razed by fire, the trustees asked Father Mestres to rent the parish hall he had erected for them for school purposes. The Catholics Father Mestres was afforded an excellent opportunity for teaching catechism. He took advantage of the opportunity and taught the catechism to the Catholic children, who remained after the regular school hours were over. Miss Lou Henry, who had come to teach in the school, aided and encouraged Father Mestres in this work.

Father Mestres returned in 1898 from Europe and Miss Henry, accompanied by Mr. Hoover, called upon him to ask if he would officiate at their approaching wedding. The priest told the young couple that he could not perform the marriage without special permission from the Bishop, and he refused to ask for this.

In February of the following year, 1899, when he had come to administer Confirmation, Bishop Montgomery was tendered a reception which both Catholics and non-Catholics attended in large numbers.

Miss Henry and Mr. Hoover were present at the reception and were introduced to the prelate. They themselves asked Bishop Montgomery to allow Father Mestres to perform the ceremony. The Bishop gave oral permission, and three or four days later the priest married the couple.

**Christians and Jews Are To Be Admitted To Cave of Abraham**

Jerusalem, Jan. 30.—The Supreme Moslem Council in Palestine has just decided that henceforth Christians and Jews may be admitted to the famous cave of Makpela, which Abraham bought from Ephron, and which served as a family sepulchre. In addition to the great patriarch Abraham himself, Sara, Isaac, Rebecca, Jacob and his wives are buried on the site.

The tower of Bebbor holds the great mosque containing this famous cave with religious fanaticism. Until 1918 Jews and Christians were not allowed to enter the holy enclosure, and the entrance to the crypt, situated to the southeast of the mosque (constructed on the ruins of an ancient basilica repaired by the Crusaders) was closed even to the followers of Mohammed.

In contrast to this action by the Supreme Moslem Council, the Government of Palestine is informed that even converts to Islam may not yet enter the sacred areas of Mecca, Medina and their environs, now ruled by the fanatical Wahabis of Nejd, without prior permission of the Hejaz Government.

**Co-Education Is Defeated In France**

Paris, Feb. 6.—The Catholic Associations of the heads of families have just won their suit against the Minister of Public Instruction, M. Herriot, in which they opposed the establishment of co-educational schools.

In the smaller communes, where there is only one class of boys and present at the reception and were one of girls, the teacher, with the pretext of facilitating his teaching, has placed the older boys and girls in his class and left the younger pupils of both sexes with the woman teacher. To establish this regime the consent of the municipal council has been obtained, with the approbation of the Minister. The Catholics maintained that this act was contrary to the spirit of school legislation, which prescribes the separation of boys and girls.

M. Herriot having recently authorized, after the consent of the municipal council had been obtained, the establishment of a co-educational school at Mauoux, the Association of the heads of families appealed to the Council of State. It annulled the decree as contrary to the law.

The feast of the Name of Mary arose at Guano, Spain, and its local celebration was approved by the Pope in 1613. Innocent XI, after the victory obtained against the Turks and the consequent relief of Vienna from siege in 1683, extended the feast and gave it to the whole Church.
