Catholic Increase In Scotland Pains Protestant Sects

London, March 13.—The "Irish invasion" of Scotland, which has for some time perturbed the Scottish Protestants, has become such a specter to those who observe with alarm the progress of the Catholic Church, that the matter may be talked about in the House of Commons. Viscount Sandon, Member of Parliament, has given notice that he will ask the Secretary of State for Scotland: "Whether his attention has been called to the large increase in the Irish Roman Catholic population of Scotland and the decrease in population of native Scotsmen, and whether in view of the arithmetical implications of this continued progress he will appoint a commission to examine the question?"

Indianapolis Group Urges Good Friday Observance There

(By N. C. W. O. News Service) Indianapolis, Ind., March 13.—An interdenominational committee for the Proper Observance of Good Friday was selected at a meeting of groups representing the Catholic Church and the Church Federation in Indianapolis a few days ago. It is the purpose of this movement to induce the merchants of Indianapolis to close their various business houses from noon to 3 o'clock on Friday April 6, in commemoration of the Crucifixion of Christ. It was suggested that petitions advocating the closing of business houses, factories and theaters for the three hours on Good Friday be circulated among the members of Catholic and Protestant churches. This suggestion was unanimously adopted, and it is anticipated that at least 100,000 signatures will be affixed to the petition before it is presented to the Merchants' Association.

Mexican Legation In Brussels Stung By Priest's Words

Louvain, March 13.—The Mexican Legation at Brussels touched by the quick by Father Ruten's speech in the Belgian Senate has addressed a communication to the papers that published the eloquent Dominican's protest. "The interior administration of Mexico goes on normally in conformity with the principles of the Constitution of the year 1917," says this Mexican communication. "Mr. Calles does no more than his duty by demanding the respect of those principles."

Priests of Malines Diocese Told How To Organize Work

Church Property Seizure Protested Limoges, France, March 11. Msgr. Flocard, Bishop of Limoges, has protested against the sale of property given in 1903 to the Church by a Mme. du Miral, but unjustly seized by the State under the Law of Separation. He calls attention to the fact that the sentence of excommunication falls upon the purchasers of ecclesiastical property.
