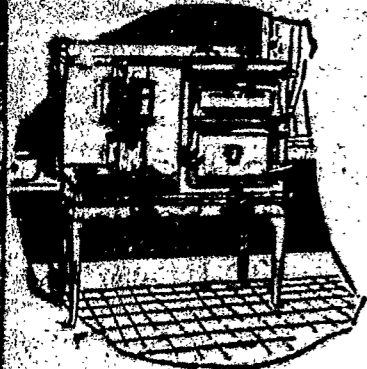

### Cardinal's Easter Message

Cardinal Dougherty, in an Easter greeting to the Knights of Columbus, makes special mention of the Selective Membership Extension program. In a letter to Supreme Knight Carmody, His Eminence writes: "It is generally acknowledged that the growth of the Knights of Columbus from a small group into its present extraordinary numbers is one of the outstanding phenomena of modern times. Their work for Church and Country, at home and abroad, is known to all; and the Order, as well as Catholics in general, may well feel proud of it.

"Your present country-wide movement for new, selected membership seems wise. For the position of your Order is too important and its record too good to permit a diminution in its numbers. The success, which you have achieved, calls for ever-increasing vigilance and for an extension of both membership and new enterprise. You have my blessing on your undertaking.

"The season of Easter, kept in commemoration of our Savior's resurrection, a season of new life, of new faith, of new courage seems particularly appropriate for your campaign in behalf of new membership. For it is a season when each and all should acquire new inspiration.

"It is my trust that all Knights of Columbus and their families, as well as all who may read this letter, may be sharers in the overflowing graces of Easter."

### Knights Gives Altars to Santa Clara Mission

James A. Badgalupi, president of the Bank of Italy, at San Francisco, has contributed money for the construction and equipping of two altars in the Santa Clara Mission, now in process of restoration. The altars of his choice are the Crucifix altar and the altar of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Designs are now being prepared and the Mission Crucifix, which was saved when the Mission burned several months ago, will be erected in a place corresponding with its location in the Mission chapel.

Brother Badgalupi is a member of Delta Council, No. 2553, and took leading part in the institution of that Council about three years ago.

### Chaplain, Charter Member, Speaker at Jubilee

Charles Carroll of Caryllton Council, No. 761, Chicago, will hold a Silver Jubilee celebration April 23 and 30 to commemorate the twenty-fifth anniversary of its institution. On Sunday, the 29th, the Council will receive Holy Communion in a body at the Presentation Church. The pastor, Rev. James J. Jennings, will preach the sermon. Father Jennings is a charter member of the Council and has been its chaplain throughout the quarter century of its existence. A banquet and ball will be held at the Palmer House, April 30. Past Grand Knight Thomas F. O'Connell is general chairman of the committee in charge.

### A Bishop and "Columbia"

A few days after the Rt. Rev. T. C. O'Reilly was made Bishop of Scranton, he sent to "Columbia" his request for a change of address. You can't blame us for feeling just a little proud that His Grace, at a time when he had much to occupy him, thought of "Columbia." And, by way, "Columbia" is now on file in 3,779 public libraries, on 151 Pullman trains, in 1,253 clubhouses, on 47 ocean liners, and in 615 schools, academies and colleges throughout America.

### National Fraternal Week

National Fraternal week this year has been officially fixed by the Executive Committee of the National Fraternal Congress of America as of April 30-May 6. It is anticipated that the observance this year will be even more widespread than on former occasions.

### Inter-Council Association Meets

Willapa Harbor Council, located at Raymond, Washington, was host Sunday, March 11, to the Knights of Columbus Inter-Council Association of Southwest Washington. Each of the seven Councils in the Association was well represented at the meeting. Many of the gatherings of 200 came from a distance of 125 miles. The shortest jaunt was a mere 50 miles. Think that over some time when you're too tired to walk a few blocks to a meeting of your Council.

### Grand Knight Bartsch Dies

Grand Knight Rudolph Bartsch of Gonzales Council No. 2523, Gonzales, Texas, died recently after a long illness. Brother Bartsch, who was 85 years old, had long been a Knight of Columbus and was a faithfully active in the cause of Catholicism in his State.

### Two Mexican Stories

Seventy American journalists and economists called on Calles at Mexico City a few weeks ago. Harry Denman, President of the Missouri Editorial Association, addressed Calles briefly, expressing the appreciation of his party for the attention shown them by the authorities. Then Calles made a speech. He told the 70 journalists and economists how pleasing it was to the Mexican Government and people to have as guests "such distinguished representatives of the American nation." Calles concluded: "All I ask you is that on the return to your country you take such impressions with you, and say of us the truth, good as well as bad. May you have a happy return trip." Then there was handshaking and the 70 journalists and economists departed for their homes. Five days later, on March 14, a New York Times dispatch from Mexico City said: "A priest and five lay persons were court-martialed and shot in a cemetery at San Luis Potosi this week. They were accused of rebellious activities. The prisoners according to the account, were taken to the cemetery in automobiles, accompanied by firing squads under command of a Major in the Federal army." Father Domaciano Villarreal was the murdered priest.

Consider the plight of the 70 American journalists and economists exhorted by Calles to tell the good, as well as the bad, about Mexico. It is difficult to find anything praiseworthy in the murder of a priest. We suggest that the troubled 70 call public attention to this example of governmental efficiency under Calles. The victims were hauled to the cemetery and there, handy to their graves, shot down. This saves the handling of bloody corpses. And the hands of Mexican officials must be kept reasonably clean. They have much handshaking to do.

### Illinois Knights Find Home for Children

One orphaned and eleven orphaned and dependent children were placed in family homes during the past year by the Catholic Home Finding Association of Illinois, a Knights of Columbus activity, according to the report made public by the superintendent, State Deputy and Supreme Director Edward Houllam. Of these, 52 were girls and 50 boys, seventy per cent of whom were under three years of age. The association also reported ninety-one adoptions of children by their foster parents during the year. The total placements made by the association during the 13 years of its activity are reported as 1,426 and adoptions 837. The association is a charity supported entirely by the Knights of Columbus of the State of Illinois.

### Inspiration

When John Raskob was 19, he was making \$7.50 a week as a stenographer. Today he is Chairman of the Finance Committee of General Motors and is reputed to be one of the wealthiest men in the world. His recent gift of \$500,000 to the Diocese of Wilmington, supplemented with a promise of \$500,000 more, has been widely discussed. Mr. Raskob has been an insurance member of the Knights of Columbus for more than 15 years. You can read the story of his career in April "Columbia."

His itinerary includes Salt Lake City, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Tucson, Phoenix, Albuquerque and other cities as designated by the State Deputies.

A successful Boyology course ended on March 13 at Butte, Montana. Butte Council, No. 668, sponsored the course and the officers and others under the guidance of Grand Knight Cullerton deserve much credit for the able manner in which the course was carried out. Joseph D. Becker of the Supreme Council, Boy Life Bureau directed the course which was attended by over 800 representatives from Butte and surrounding areas.
